
We believe in God who has created and is creating, who has come to us in Jesus Christ to reconcile and make us new, who works in us and others by the Holy Spirit.



Lights Out Chicago!

Chicago sits on a major bird migratory route called the Mississippi Flyway. Hundreds of species fly over our city. Unfortunately, thousands of birds perish due to collisions with all sizes of buildings. "Birds navigate using natural light emitted from the sun, moon and stars," but species navigating at night are disoriented by artificial light and may run into buildings. The Lights Out Chicago program was created to keep birds on their natural trajectory by encouraging building owners to dim or turn off the lights at night, thereby preventing collisions. Do your bit: if you see dead birds where you frequent, speak to management, or dim your own lights if you see them around your house. –Adapted from *Bird Migration Through the Windy City*, Peggy Notebaert Museum, April 20, 2021.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Symbiosis was composed in 2023 by Kris Hansen (b. 1995). The music expresses a collective experience of support. Kris, a member of our St. Arbucks Quartet, was raised, baptized, and confirmed at St. Pauls. He is an active singer, music producer, composer, trumpet player, and keyboard player in his own group, Semi-Cycle. He also performs regularly with other bands, including: The Walters, Kweku Collins, and Othersides.

In the Midst of New Dimensions is a newer hymn (1985) with both music and text composed by Julian Rush (b. 1936) in a traditional Protestant hymn style. The Reverend Rush is an openly gay minister ordained in the United Methodist Church. His book, *Julian Rush-Facing the Music: A Gay Methodist Minister's Story,* details his trials within his denomination after coming out after many closeted years. The text of the refrain, *God of rainbow* ... is appropriate not only because of its reference to the covenant after the flood in the Hebrew Bible, but also the rainbow of acceptance and pride we celebrate as an Open and Affirming congregation and during Pride Month.

O God Beyond All Praising is by Gustav Holst (1874–1934). The tune is called THAXTED, which is the main theme of the Jupiter movement from Holst's *The Planets*. It is truly a majestic hymn. Thaxted is the village where Holst grew up. It was Ralph Vaughan Williams that adapted "Thaxted"as a hymn. The author of our text is Michael A. Perry (1942–1996). He began studies as a physicist and changed to theology.

Come Ye Sinners, Poor And Needy, to the tune RESTORATION, is mined from the wonderful early 19th century American shape-note hymnals, including *Southern Harmony*. Its composer and lyricist are unknown, but it was first published in 1835. The melody is characterized by a folk-like swing.

There Is a Balm in Gilead is a Black Spiritual. In the Hebrew Bible, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River. This region was known for having skilled physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree particular to that area. Many believed that this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief of their oppression. For slaves in our country, crossing the Jordan River was code for escaping their bondage by escaping to the North, traversing such rivers as the Potomac and Ohio.

César Franck (1822-1890), the composer of this setting of **Psalm 150**, was born in Belgium the son of a German mother, studied at Paris Conservatory and settled in Paris in 1844. He was also an organist (eventually at the church of Ste. Clotilde, Paris) and noted teacher. Among his students were Henri Duparc, Charles Tournemire, and Louis Vièrne. He composed chamber music, piano and organ works, many songs, religious cantatas, and four operas.

I Sing the Mighty Power of God is a text by Issac Watts (1674-1848), the eminent English poet, who set the entire books of Psalms as poetry, including Psalm 90, *Our God Our Help in Ages Past*. His poetry has inspired many composers. The tune, ELLACOMBE, is unattributed and of German origin first published in a hymnal in 1784. In the 19th century, the tune was named for a village in Devonshire.

Fugue in G minor "Little" BWV 578 was composed by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750). Bach is the acknowledged master of fugue composition. A fugue is a complex version of a round usually involving four to five layered voices using the same theme, but entering at different times and starting on different pitches.
