



Do You Know Your Carbon Footprint? A carbon footprint is the total amount of greenhouse gas emissions coming from the production, use and end-of-life of a product or service. The measure includes gasses, particularly carbon dioxide. The majority of an individual's carbon footprint is related to housing, food and transportation. A high negative contributor to your footprint are fossil fuels, particularly with airplane travel. Many of us travel during the holidays. Rather than jet travel, consider traveling by train. TODAY'S MUSIC

Ein feste Burg Op. 27 (A Mighty Fortress) was composed in 1898 by Max Reger (1873-1916). It is a chorale fantasia, which is a very decorated and extended composition based on a hymn tune. As with a number of Reger's organ compositions, it is dedicated to Karl Straube (1873-1950). Straube was a phenomenal organist who actually had a bet with Reger that he couldn't compose anything that Straube couldn't play. Straube never lost the bet, and as you can well imagine, Reger's organ compositions are incredibly dense and difficult. Reger's name is not well known outside Germany and organists, but he has a huge list of compositions. Reger's music "dances" on the cusp of the final throes of romanticism before the "modern" music era was ushered in by such composers as Stravinsky and Schoenberg.

There is no better way as a church with a strong German heritage to celebrate the Reformation than with multiple settings of *A Mighty Fortress*, the great Martin Luther hymn. Arguably the greatest Martin Luther (1483-1546) hymn, it encapsulates the theology of the Lutheran Church. Today's Introit is the original almost dance-like rhythmic version that Luther composed and congregations of that time sang. The recessional hymn presents a more majestic march. The final stanza is a harmonization of the final chorale by Bach (1685–1750) from his cantata bearing the tune name, EIN FESTE BURG, which is taken from the first words of the hymn in the original German.

The music for *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* (ODE TO JOY) was composed by Beethoven (1770-1827) and is the chorale melody from the final movement of his *Ninth Symphony* (1824). The original German text (1785) was by the famous poet and dramatist Friedrich Schiller (1759-1805), and the English text was composed in 1907 by Henry Van Dyke (1852-1933). Van Dyke was an American author and clergyman. He was appointed ambassador to the Netherlands by President Woodrow Wilson prior to the outbreak of World War I.

Great Is Thy Faithfulness, tune FAITHFULNESS, dates from 1923 and was composed by William M. Runyan (1870-1957). He finished his ministry in Kansas and was particularly fond of the poet Thomas Chisholm (1866-1960), who wrote this text. Runyan set 25 of Chisholm's poems to music. Chisholm based this text on Lamentation 3:22 & 23: *Because of the Lord's great love, we are not consumed.*

The text for *God, We Thank You for Our People* was written in 1986 by Ruth Duck (b. 1947). She is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ and has written four volumes of hymn texts. HOLY MANNA is an unattributed melody from the great American series of early 19th century shaped-note hymnals, including *The Sacred Harp*.

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) wrote six motets that are virtuoso pieces for a "regular" church choir. *Lobet den Herrn* (Praise the Lord) BWV 230 is the sixth of the motets and is based on Psalm 117. The composition date is unknown. The motet features vocally effervescent choral writing at the opening and in the *Alleluia* at the close. The middle section describing God's grace is a contrast using more lyric and liquid writing.

A Mighty Fortress is arguably Martin Luther's (1483-1546) greatest hymn and encapsulates the theology of the Lutheran Church. The tune name, EIN FESTE BURG, are the first three words of the original German text. Luther's original version is almost dance-like in rhythm. The recessional hymn presents a more majestic march.

This jazz setting of *A Mighty Fortress* by Martin Luther (1483-1546) was arranged by Carol Tornquist (1945-2022). She grew up in southwestern Pennsylvania and began playing piano at the age 4. Upon graduation with a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education, she taught vocal music in upstate New York. After visiting her songwriting brother John Thompson in Nashville, she decided to move there and hone her craft as a composer and arranger of Christian music and piano method books.
