

SCRIPTURE

Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power; put on the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil, for our struggle is not against blood and flesh but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. Therefore take up the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to withstand on the evil day and, having prevailed against everything, to stand firm. Stand, therefore, and belt your waist with truth and put on the breastplate of righteousness and lace up your sandals in preparation for the gospel of peace. With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

In the same way, prayer is essential in this ongoing warfare. Pray hard and long. Pray for your siblings. Keep your eyes open. Keep each other's spirits up so that no one falls behind or drops out. And don't forget to pray for me. Pray that I will know what to say and have the courage to say it at the right time, telling the mystery of the Gospel to one and all, the message that I, jailbird preacher that I am, am responsible for proclaiming.

to care for creation,







TODAY'S MUSIC

Andraé Crouch (1942-2015) wrote both the text and tune for *How Can I Say Thanks*, MY TRIBUTE, in 1971. Crouch is among the greatest gospel composers and performers. Both his mother and father were pastors, and he first began playing at services for his father's church at age 11. The opening lines of the refrain, *To God be the glory*, pays homage to Fanny Crosby (1820-1915) by quoting her famous hymn text.

Deck Thyself My Soul With Gladness is one of the great German communion hymns. It is often referred to by church musicians as "the queen of communion chorales." SCHMÜCKE DICH (*Deck Thyself, My Soul, With Gladness*) was composed by Johann Crüger (1598-1662). This hymn, which is also the subject of our Prelude, was set for organ by Bach (1685-1750) and many other German composers. Crüger also composed *Nun danket alle Gott (Now Thank We All Our God*).

The text of *I Come With Joy* was written by Brian Wren (b. 1936), a pastor in the Congregational Church in England. He wrote the hymn as a summary of a series of sermons on the meaning of communion. The tune is an old American hymn, DOVE OF PEACE, from the *Southern Harmony* hymnal, part of the Sacred Harp tradition. It was arranged by Austin Lovelace (1919-2010), who for several years was Organist and Choirmaster at First United Methodist Church in Evanston.

Traumerei from *Kinderszenen* Op.15, No. 7 was composed in 1838 by Robert Schumann (1810-1856). It is arguably his most recognised work for piano. It was composed when Robert and his future wife, Clara, were courting. The melody is simple, lyric and very touching.

Alexandr Scriabin (1887-1915) composed the Op. 11 *Preludes* between 1888 and 1896. *No. 2 in A Minor* was composed in 1887 and *No. 4 in E Minor* in 1889. His compositions straddled the transition from Romanticism to 20th century modernity. Early works were influenced by Chopin and later ones by Schoenberg. Influenced by metaphysics and Russian symbolism, he was recognised for his innovation as a composer. Leo Tolstoy called his music a "sincere expression of genius."

Jesus Loves Me This I Know is one of the first hymns many children learn. The words are both simple and profound. They were written in 1859 by Anna Bartlett Warner (1824-1915). Born in New York City, she wrote many hymn texts and collaborated with her sister Sarah on novels. The composer of the tune, JESUS LOVES ME, was William Bradbury (1816–1868). He penned this sweet melody in 1861, and also composed the famous hymn *Just As I Am.*

Over My Head is another text and melody from the great wealth of spirituals. Its current version was arranged in 1981 by Verolga Nix (1933-2014), a world-class pianist and graduate of Oberlin Conservatory; and J. Jefferson Cleveland (1937-1986), one of the most important scholars of African American spirituals. Cleveland and Nix collaborated on a seminal work about African American music, *Songs of Zion*. It is actually a shortened version, including only the very catchy refrain of a longer song.

Psalm 150 was set in 1871 by Louis Lewandowski (1821-1894). Originally, the text was in Hebrew. Born in Poland, he moved to Berlin after his mother's death because of the family's extreme poverty. He was aided by Alexander Mendelssohn, cousin of Felix. He was the first Jew admitted to the Berlin Academy of the Arts. After recovering from serious health problems, he decided to devote his life to composing music for the synagogue. He was in the forefront of the growth of Reform Judaism. In 1882, he wrote the first complete setting of the Jewish Sabbath liturgy for cantor, four part choir, and organ.

E.A. Hoffman (1839-1929) wrote the text for *What a Covenant* in 1877. Many of us learned that hymn as *What a Fellowship*. He was an ordained minister and wrote more than 2,000 gospel songs in his lifetime. The tune bears two names, LEANING, which is the first word of the refrain, and SHOWALTER in honor of the composer, A. J. Showalter (1858-1924). He actually began teaching shape-note singing at age 14. He attended a number of private Christian music programs to learn his craft.

Walk All Over God's Heaven, is more of a new creation than an arrangement by Mahalia Jackson (1911-1972), who took inspiration from the old hymn I Got a Robe, You Got a Robe. Ms. Jackson has a direct connection to St. Pauls. Brendan Henry grew up so loving her music and her deep spiritual commitment that his daughter is named after her. While Ms. Jackson was born in Mississippi, her connection to Chicago was long and deep. She had a profound commitment to the civil rights movement and was behind the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. as he spoke at the Lincoln Monument. In recordings of that event, you can hear her shouting, "Tell them about The Dream, Martin!" Although she toured the world, she called Chicago her home and came back during her final illness. Studs Terkel was among her biggest fans and champions. She is now memorialized, along with her equally famous colleague, Thomas A. Dorsey, in our sanctuary music windows on the south aisle.
