





TODAY'S MUSIC

Variations on Morning Song-Finale was composed by Robert Grogan. He was the Carillonneur and Organist at The Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. An "occasional" composer for organ, carillon and the liturgy, his intention in the present set of variations was to base all treatments of the tune (harmonic and modal usage, figuration types, and contrapuntal applications) directly upon inherent characteristics of the tune itself.

The text for *Awake, Awake to Love and Work* was composed in 1921 by Geoffrey Anketel Studdert Kenndey (1883-1929), who was an Anglican minister of proud Irish descent. He spent his life working in deprived surroundings. The tune, MORNING SONG, is from another great early American shape-note hymnal, *Kentucky Harmony*. The melody is based on the English folk song *Old King Cole*.

O Come, O Come Emmanuel is thought of as a Christmas carol, but its text definitely references the anticipation of Advent. The original Latin, VENI EMMANUEL, was translated in 1851 by J. M. Neale (1818-1866). He was a member of the British clergy, and struggled with ill-health his entire life. Neale also composed the texts for many other hymns, including *All Glory Laud and Honor*, and translated many other Latin texts, such as *Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence*.

The text for *As We Gather at Your Table* was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister and also has a Ph.D. in English literature. He has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879) and is first found in the great American shape-note hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence employs a French carol melody, PICARDY, from the 17th century that was harmonized in 1906 by the great 20th century English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). The words are a translation and paraphrase of a hymn from the Greek Liturgy of St. James.

E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come was composed by Paul Manz (1919-2009) in 1953. He composed this anthem while in a hospital waiting room awaiting results of the surgery on his child who had been injured in an automobile accident. His son survived. It has been performed widely, including for *Lessons and Carols* at King's College Cambridge in England. He was a graduate of Concordia College in River Forest and Northwestern University.

The text for *Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus* was written by the great English hymn writer, Charles Wesley (1707–1788). He wrote more than 6,500 hymn texts. The composer of HYFRYDOL, Roland Hugh Prichard (1811–1887), was from Wales and was only 19 when he composed this piece.

Rejoice! - Richard Smallwood (b. 1948) is one of the top composers and performers of Gospel music. His group, The Richard Smallwood Singers, has toured the world. He is a graduate of Howard University, which also counts Vice President Kamala Harris and so many other luminaries as alumni. He was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 2006.
