



Mark 12:41-13:8, 37

Jesus sat down opposite the temple treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into it. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on." Leaving the Leaves (adapted from the New York Times, October 20, 2023)

A pile of autumn leaves is home to an entire ecosystem, such as invisible fungi and microbes, and is particularly important in the life cycle of pollinators, such as moths and butterflies, who may rely on the leaf layer to over-winter and emerge in the spring. The organic matter from the decomposed leaves amends Chicago's poor soil without needing to use fertilizers. It also helps increase water absorption and naturally abate run off. Leave the leaves on the lawn in a natural carpet, if possible. Short of that, distribute them under trees or elsewhere in the garden in a thin carpet.

Extensively trained in compassionate Christian caregiving, Stephen Ministers are matched confidentially with someone in our congregation who is going through a crisis, such as the death of a loved one, a diagnosis, a divorce, a job loss, etc. They meet with you once a week for an hour to offer support through listening, companionship and prayer. TODAY'S MUSIC

The ***Prelude and Fugue in E Flat Major*** BWV 552 “bookends” this service and also serves the same opening and closing to Johann Sebastian Bach’s (1685-1750) incredible collection, *Clavier-Übung III*. It is a monumental work of music for liturgical services. The *Fugue* is often called “St. Anne,” because the first subject of the fugue sounds exactly like the tune for *O God, Our Help in Ages Past*. Bach had no knowledge of that tune and it is really an interesting coincidence that it sounds like our beloved English hymn. The fugue can also be considered a “Trinity fugue,” because it is in three parts, Creator, Christ and Holy Spirit.

The text for ***God Is Here! As We Your People Meet*** was written in 1971 by Fred Pratt Green (1903-2000). Born in Liverpool, he was one of the most prominent hymnodists in Britain and became a Methodist minister. The tune, ABBOT'S LEIGH, was composed in 1941 by Cyril Vincent Taylor (1907-1992). Taylor was both a musician and a priest in the Church of England. He composed 20 hymns and edited a number of hymnals.

God of Grace and God of Glory has, for us, the unusual Welsh tune name CWM RHONDDA. The text we know is by the famous American author and Baptist clergyman, Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969). He wrote this text in 1930. The well-known tune was composed in 1905 by John Hughes (1873-1932). He had very little formal education and became a deacon and precentor, lay minister positions, in his Baptist church. He wrote this tune for a Welsh Baptist choral festival.

Be Thou My Vision is a lovely Irish folk tune, SLANE. The translation was made in 1905 from the original Gaelic by Mary E. Byrne (1880-1931), who was born in Ireland. She was a respected university level academic in Dublin.

The text for ***Child of Blessing, Child of Promise*** was written in 1981 by a UCC pastor and teacher of theology, Ronald Cole-Turner (b. 1948). The tune, STUTTGART, was composed in 1715 by Christian Friederich Witt (1660-1716). Witt completed a huge hymnal, *Psalmodia Sacra*, the year before his death. Of the 774 hymns (!!!), he composed nearly 100. He was Kapellmeister of the Gotha court in Stuttgart at the same time that Bach was in Leipzig, just 300 miles north. An interesting side note is that Nathan Laube, world renowned organist and friend of St. Pauls, was until recently on the organ faculty at the Hochschule für Musik in Stuttgart. He has since returned to the faculty at the Eastman School of Music.

My Life Flows on in Endless Song was composed, both the text and the tune, ENDLESS SONG, by Robert Lowry (1826-1899). Lowry was a preacher and scholar with a musical background from his childhood.

O How Amiable was composed in 1934 by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1871-1958). It is a wonderful example of an English form of church music called a “verse anthem.” The first well-known composer of this form was Gustav Holst (1874-1934), a contemporary of Vaughan Williams. In general, the verse anthem is a simpler church anthem based on a familiar hymn tune with additional musical variations.

How Firm a Foundation, although of anonymous origin, is a true American hymn first published in Funk’s *Genuine Church Music* in 1832. That hymnal is part of what is often referred to as the Sacred Harp, or shape-note hymnal, tradition in our country which began in the early 19th century. These treasures gained a rebirth during the bicentennial celebrations in 1976. Did you know that before the revival of this tune, FOUNDATION, this text was most often sung to the tune *Adeste Fideles* (*O Come All Ye Faithful*)? The text is also unattributed, but first discovered by John Rippon (1751–1836), who was an English Baptist clergyman. He noted the author as “K.”
