#### **SCRIPTURE**

#### Mark 10:17-31

As he was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder. You shall not commit adultery. You shall not steal. You shall not bear false witness. You shall not defraud. Honor your father and mother.'" He said to him, "Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth." Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." They were greatly astounded and said to one another, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible."

Peter began to say to him, "Look, we have left everything and followed you." Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields for my sake and for the sake of the good news who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first."



**Edible Super Heroes** 

Thanksgiving and the Christmas holidays are just around the corner. Much of our focus will be around holiday food; thus, it is a good time to remind ourselves which are the better choices for ourselves and the planet.

"Edible crops—whole grains and legumes (beans, lentils, whole wheat and rice) but also tubers (potatoes and sweet potatoes) and even some starchy tree fruits (jack fruit and bananas)—are where the climate action is. They are healthful, nutritious, versatile and much less perishable than garden variety fruits and vegetables. They deliver calories and nutrition in one package, use fewer inputs (water, fertilizer), and are often grown without irrigation.

#### **TODAY'S MUSIC**

The text for *Draw Us in the Spirit's Tether* was written in 1931 by Percy Dearmer (1867-1936). He was ordained into ministry in the Church of England and was also one of the editors of the *English Hymnal 1906*. The tune, UNION SEMINARY, was composed in 1957 by Harold Friedell (1905-1958), an American organist, choirmaster, teacher, and composer. He was also a member of the faculty of Union Theological Seminary in New York City, which explains his choice for the name of the tune.

The text for *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling* was written by Charles Wesley (1707-1788). His brother, John, was the founder of the Methodist faith. The words are set to the tune, BEECHER by John Zundel (1815-1882) and named after the famed preacher, Henry Ward Beecher. We also sing this tune to the text *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven*. This text is one of the few that is the source of a "hymn battle" over which tune to sing. The other well-known tune for this text is HYFRYDOL.

Joel Ross (b. 1995) is a jazz vibraphonist born and raised in Chicago. He got his start musically by playing drums in the Baptist church on the south side where his father was the music director. His early formal training began when he was among the first entering class of the Chicago High School for the Arts. After moving to New York City in 2015, he formed his own band, Good Vibes. *bach (God the Father in Eternity)* was released in January this year on Blue Note. Ross employs a melodic fragment of a choral of J.S. Bach (1685-1750) and marries it with the repetition and layering that is an integral part of music in the Black Church.

The text for *As We Gather at Your Table* was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister and has a Ph.D. in English literature. He has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879) and was first found in the great American shape-note hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

The text for *Will You Come and Follow Me* was written by John Bell (b. 1949). He was born in Scotland and after considering a career as a music teacher, went into ministry. He has enjoyed serving as a youth minister in impoverished areas of Scotland. THE SUMMONS is a folk melody, KELVINGROVE, which derives its name from a park in Glasgow, Scotland.

The setting of *Jubilate Deo*, Psalm 100, was composed in 1961 by Benjamin Britten (1913-1976). Composed at the request of Prince Phillip, H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh for St. George's Chapel in Windsor Castle, it was sung at his 80th and 90th birthdays and also at his funeral in 2021. The organ part seeks to imitate the harmonics of bells, and the choral parts are a dialogue between sections that urge each other to praise God. These outbursts of joy are contrasted with hushed portions describing the qualities of graciousness and mercy. The exuberance has a Christmas-like joy.

*O Jesus, I Have Promised* is a text created by John Bode (1816-1874). He was a prominent Episcopalian clergyman and well-respected scholar. He composed many hymn texts in addition to poetry. MUNICH is a 17th century German melody adapted in 1847 by Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847). Along with Beethoven and Brahms, Mendelssohn was one of the great German Romantic composers. He almost single-handedly reintroduced the music of J.S. Bach (1685-1750) to a larger audience when he conducted the first performances of Bach's *St. Matthew Passion* after Bach's death. Mendelssohn's own great oratorios, *Elijah* and *St. Paul* were often performed, especially in England. Sadly, both Mendelssohn and his family suffered the pains of antisemitism in his native Germany.

*Walk All Over God's Heaven*, is more a new creation than an arrangement by Mahalia Jackson (1911-1972). She took inspiration from the old hymn *I Got a Robe*, *You Got a Robe*. Ms. Jackson has a direct connection with St. Pauls. Brendan Henry grew up loving her music and his deep spiritual commitment to her caused him to name his daughter after her. Born in Mississippi, she had a long commitment to the civil rights movement and was behind the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. when he spoke at the Lincoln Monument. In recordings of that event, you can hear her shouting at Dr. King, "Tell them about the dream, Martin!" Although Ms. Jackson toured the world, her connection to Chicago was long and deep and she called Chicago her home. Studs Terkel was among her biggest fans and champions. Returning to Chicago during her final illness, she is memorialized, along with her equally famous colleague, Thomas A. Dorsey, in our music windows on the south aisle.
