





Luke 2:8-14


SCRIPTURE Jeff Carlson

Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. 

ADVENT WREATH - Each week during Advent we light another candle in our Advent wreath to anticipate the coming of Christ, the light of the world. These candles symbolize the gifts of hope, love, joy and peace that Christ's coming brings. Today, we light the candle of Joy.

PINK CANDLE, WHY? - This is *Gaudete* (Rejoice) Sunday. Both Advent and Lent are considered penitential seasons, but the early church leaders decided that each of those seasons need an uplifting break. That is why on Gaudete Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent, the liturgical color changes from purple to pink or rose.

Just before Thanksgiving, Community Renewal Society members traveled to Jerusalem to align against apartheid and occupation. One delegate shared, "What if the moment we've come to know is a myth? ... We can debate the details of the situation, but I'm cautious of a settlement history that solely centers on celebration. After recently returning from a sacred pilgrimage to Israel/Palestine, I am unashamedly suspicious of the stories we choose to tell and how we ourselves will be remembered...So the question becomes, what will we choose to remember?" CREATION CORNER - provided by Green Team

At the Federal level, we are in for a rough ride with an attempt to roll back many conservation and green initiatives. We should neither feel dejected nor defeated. According to Jennifer L. Morris, CEO of the Nature Conservancy, 94% of voters in the United States support conservation initiatives. Indeed, nationally, 13 ballot initiatives related to climate and conservation representing \$18 billion were approved. One such initiative in Illinois will allocate more than \$500 million to conservation in forest preserves. This means that politically green initiatives will need greater local and regional emphasis and strategies. Those areas particularly of interest to voters are clean water, wildfire prevention and ecological resilience.

UPDATE ON 2025 PHASE II` CONSTRUCTION PLANS TO "EXPAND AND ELEVATE SAINT PAULS' OPENNESS"

On October 20, our members unanimously and joyfully approved moving forward with Phase II of our long-awaited capital construction project. In disciplined planning and thoughtful review since 2016, the endorsed final work phase will make our entire public building complex more welcoming and fully accessible through the installation of a five-stop elevator and a beautiful open-air courtyard with a new north-end building access ramp.

Project general contractor Bulley & Andrews, St. Pauls owner's rep Lorne Frank, and architect Larry Kearns have met regularly to lay out a work plan for 2025. To maximize efficiency and minimize costs, work on the exterior and interior will happen concurrently from March through early November. The planned schedule for the phases of work is summarized in the following table:

O Come, O Come Emmanuel is thought of as a Christmas carol, but its text definitely references the anticipation of Advent. The original Latin, VENI EMMANUEL, is an unattributed chant melody. This haunting arrangement by Brendan Henry is also included on the St. Arbucks seasonal recording, *Mid-Winter Gifts*. Please see the details on how to hear it in the announcements.

There Was a Little Baby is a traditional children's carol arranged in 1983 by Raffi (b. 1948). He is an Armenian-Canadian lyricist who was born in Egypt. The Washington Post called him "the most popular children's singer in the English-speaking world." Nearly any parent of a young child born in the '80s or after can still sing at least one Raffi song they learned with their child.

Once in Royal David's City became popular as the traditional opening carol of the Festival of Lessons and Carols broadcast each year from King's College Chapel at Cambridge in England. The text was composed in 1848, not long after the 1843 founding of our St. Pauls UCC, by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895), the wife of the bishop of Ireland. She wrote many hymn texts specifically for children. The tune, IRBY, was composed in 1849 by Henry J. Gauntlett (1805-1876). Gauntlett became the organist at his father's church, and after beginning a career in law, gave it up to become a full-time church musician. He even held patents on organ mechanical parts.

The poetry for *O Little Town of Bethlehem* has a wonderful story. Phillips Brooks (1835-1893), an American, took a trip to Israel in 1865 at the close of the Civil War. Reverend Brooks spent Christmas 1866 in Bethlehem and, as a result of that visit, this poem poured forth in 1868. ST. LOUIS, which is the tune most Americans know, was also composed in 1868 by Louis Redner (1831-1908), a Sunday School superintendent in Philadelphia. It was composed the night before it was sung at his church and it is the only one for which he is remembered.

Whatcha Gonna Call That Baby? was composed in 1999 by Phyllis Wolfe-White, who is on the faculty of Oakland University in Rochester, Michigan. She actually got her first work published as an undergraduate at the same institution. She has more than 100 titles published for children's voices. She holds Bachelors, Master's and Ph.D. degrees, all from Oakland. This cheerful setting uses Latin calypso rhythms to add to the joy.

O Christmas Tree is also known by its original German title, *O Tannenbaum*. It was translated into English in 1926 by H. Breuckner (1866-1942). Breuckner was born in Iowa and died in rural Nebraska. He was a pastor and also on the faculty of Hebron College in Nebraska. The text models the evergreen pine to never fading faith. The tune, EVERGREEN, is a German folk song of unknown origin.

The composer, Mykola Leontovich (1877-1921), was a Ukrainian composer, conductor, ethnomusicologist, and teacher. Although he composed many works, *The Carol of the Bells* is his most performed work outside his homeland. He was assassinated by a Soviet agent in 1921. Peter J. Wilhousky (1902-1978) translated and made the most well-known arrangement in 1936. He was also of Ukrainian descent and wrote a famous arrangement of *Battle Hymn of the Republic*. The arranger for this version is Chicago-based Mark Dover.

Angels We Have Heard on High is originally an 18th century French noël (carol) freely translated by James Chadwick (1813-1882), an Irish Catholic priest. GLORIA is from the text of the joyfully cascading Latin refrain, which we sing as a Benediction Response after Christmas and during Epiphany.

The words for *It Came Upon a Midnight Clear* were written in 1849 by Edmund H. Sears (1810-1876). He was born in this country and moved to England in 1838. Ill health forced him to retire to a quiet life of literature. The text doesn't refer to Christmas at all in the eight original stanzas. Rather, it calls people out in the build-up towards the Civil War and recent conclusion of the Mexican-American War. The well-known music, CAROL, was composed in 1850 by Richard Storrs Willis (1819-1900). He was an American composer, particularly drawn to creating hymn tunes.

Theodore Baker (1851-1934) translated the original German into the English we love, *Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming*. He was born in New York City and immigrated to Germany, where he spent the rest of his life. His famously created *Baker's Biographical Dictionary of Musicians* was first published in 1900. ES IST EIN' ROS was first published in 1599 in the *Cöln Gesangbuch*.

The text of *In the Bleak Midwinter* was composed by Christina Georgina Rossetti (1830–1894) in 1872. She was a prolific English poet. The tune, CRANHAM, is by Gustav Holst (1874–1934), who is best known as the composer of *The Planets*.

Gospel Nativity Carol is an Edisto Island spiritual. Edisto Island is on the Atlantic coast near Charleston, South Carolina. Before our Civil War, enslaved Africans cultivated rice and cotton on large plantations. Craig Curry, who arranged this great spiritual in a Gospel style is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed. He is currently Composer In Residence at Friends University in Wichita, Kansas.

Good Christian Friends, Rejoice is a translation of the original Latin by John Mason Neale (1818-1886). He was born into an evangelical home, became an Anglican clergyman, but had real sympathies for Catholicism. IN DULCI JUBILO, which means "in sweet rejoicing," is an early undated folk dance.

Go Now in Peace was composed in 1976 by Natalie Sleeth (1930-1992), who became one of the most performed and popular composers of church anthems especially for children's voices. One of her hymns, *In the Bulb There Is a Flower*, was chosen for our *New Century Hymnal*. She was born in Evanston and received her musical training at Wellesley College where her husband was a professor of homiletics.

John Iveson (b. 1941), the arranger of *A Carol Fantasy*, began his career in 1965 as co-principal trombone of the BBC Symphony Orchestra. He has held principal positions in major British orchestras and the Royal Opera House. He is also the principal trombonist with the renowned Philip Jones Brass Ensemble. He was also on the faculty of the Royal College of Music for more than 25 years.
