



How to Know Whether Wrapping Paper Is Recyclable

Regular wrapping paper (including the glossy stuff) is often recyclable as long as it does not have non-paper additions. This includes paper that has been dyed, laminated, and contains metals, plastics or glitter embedded within it or anywhere on it. If your paper is not labeled recyclable, it is safe to try the scrunch test: if you are able to scrunch up a piece of wrapping paper that stays scrunched up, it's likely safe to recycle. #### UPDATE ON 2025 PHASE II CONSTRUCTION PLANS TO "EXPAND AND ELEVATE SAINT PAULS' OPENNESS"

On October 20, our members unanimously and joyfully approved moving forward with Phase II of our long-awaited capital construction project. In disciplined planning and thoughtful review since 2016, the endorsed final work phase will make our entire public building complex more welcoming and fully accessible through the installation of a five-stop elevator and a beautiful open-air courtyard with a new north-end building access ramp.

Project general contractor Bulley & Andrews, St. Pauls owner's rep Lorne Frank, and architect Larry Kearns have met regularly to lay out a work plan for 2025. To maximize efficiency and minimize costs, work on the exterior and interior will happen concurrently from March through early November. The planned schedule for the phases of work is summarized in the following table:

#### **TODAY'S MUSIC**

In 1896, Johannes Brahms (1833-1897) created this setting for organ of *Es ist ein' Ros entsprungen*, *Op. 122, No. 8* that we know as *Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming*. The organ music of Brahms is not as well known as his symphonies, but his music for the organ has the same beauty and harmonic craftsmanship as his symphonic works. The tune ES IST EIN' ROS is unattributed and was first published in 1599 in the Cöln Gesangbuch.

The text for *Joy to the World* was composed in 1719 by the famous British poet and theologian, Issac Watts (1674-1748). Watts' great contribution was setting the entire Book of Psalms poetically. This is a paraphrase of both Psalms 98 and 96. One of his most well beloved texts is *Our God, Our Help in Ages Past*. ANTIOCH was composed by George Friderick Handel (1685-1759), who also composed *Messiah*, and was adapted as a hymn by Lowell Mason (1792-1872). Mason is often referred to as the father of American church music for his contributions.

James L. Haddix (b. 1946) wrote the text for *O God Whose Steadfast Love* in 1986 and revised it in 1994. The tune, RHOSYMEDRE, was composed in 1840 by John David Edwards (1806-1885). He was an Anglican priest and the tune name is taken from one of the parishes he served in Wales.

The carol, *I Saw Three Ships*, could hardly be more English! Both the tune and the words are unattributed and date to sometime in the mid-19th century. It imagines Jesus, Mary and Joseph not in a manger, but arriving on three ships on Christmas Day. Then the ships sail to Bethlehem. That's fairly English specific! It would be like our music director from Omaha, Nebraska composing a carol about Jesus arriving on a barge in the Missouri River, BUT the point is that the Savior comes to all of us where we are.

*Glory, Glory, Glory to the New Born King* is based on the well-known spiritual *Go Tell It on the Mountain.* It is characterized by both serenity and great energy. In his all too brief life, Moses Hogan (1957–2003) continued and added to the great tradition of spiritual arrangement that included William Dawson. He recorded a number of compact discs and wrote solo arrangements for such singers as Kathleen Battle. He also was commissioned to compose the anthem *Home In-a That Rock* for our Chancel Choir and Ron McCowan.

*In the Bleak Midwinter* text was composed by prolific English poet Christina Georgina Rossetti (1830–1894) in 1872. The tune, CRANHAM, is by Gustav Holst (1874–1934), who is best known as the composer of *The Planets*.

*Hark! The Herald Angels Sing* is easily among the most well-known Christmas carols. The text was written by the famous Methodist clergyman Charles Wesley (1749-1788) in 1739, and was altered to its present version in the same year by George Whitefield (1714-1770). The tune name, MENDELSSOHN, takes its name from its famous German composer, Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847), who was much beloved in England. The melody is borrowed from a larger work, *Festgesang, Op. 68*, composed in 1840.

*Christmas Is Coming* was composed by Vince Guaraldi (1928-1976) and is a musical theme from the made-for-TV movie, *A Charlie Brown Christmas* (1965), which also includes his jazz instrumental standard, *Linus and Lucy*. He also created music for other animated features and won a Grammy in 1963 for Best Original Jazz Composition for *Cast Your Fate to the Wind*.


