




THE LORD'S PRAYER


STEPHEN MINISTRY AT ST. PAULS

UPDATE ON 2025 PHASE II CONSTRUCTION PLANS TO "EXPAND AND ELEVATE SAINT PAULS' OPENNESS"

On October 20, our members unanimously and joyfully approved moving forward with Phase II of our long-awaited capital construction project. In disciplined planning and thoughtful review since 2016, the endorsed final work phase will make our entire public building complex more welcoming and fully accessible through the installation of a five-stop elevator and a beautiful open-air courtyard with a new north-end building access ramp.

Project general contractor Bulley & Andrews, St. Pauls owner's rep Lorne Frank, and architect Larry Kearns have met regularly to lay out a work plan for 2025. To maximize efficiency and minimize costs, work on the exterior and interior will happen concurrently from March through early November. The planned schedule for the phases of work is summarized in the following table:

Our project team has met with St. Pauls, Lighthouse Church, and Little Lights program staff members to ensure that all are aware of and can plan for/around the implications of all phases of the construction.

TODAY'S MUSIC

O Happy Day was composed by Edwin Hawkins (1943- 2018). He was an artist of wide ranging talents: gospel musician, singer, pianist, composer, arranger, and choir master. He was born in Oakland, California, and was already playing keyboards at age 7 for his family's gospel group. *O Happy Day* is his most performed and remembered work.

The text for **O Day of Radiant Gladness** was composed in 1862 by Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885). Nephew of the famous poet, William Wordsworth, he had a long career as a priest in the Anglican Church. The tune, ES FLOG EIN KLEINS WALDVÖGELEIN, is a 17th century German folk melody first published in a manuscript found in Memmingen.

The text for *Arise, Your Light Is Come* was written in 1974 by Ruth Duck (b. 1947), one of the most influential hymn composers of our time having penned more than 150 hymn texts. She is an ordained pastor in the United Church of Christ, and retired professor of worship at Garrett-Evangelical Seminary in Evanston, Illinois. The tune, FESTAL SONG, was composed in 1872 by William H. Walter (1825-1893). He became a public school music teacher and was also the organist at Trinity Church in New Your City. He composed more than 40 hymn tunes.

Be Thou My Vision is a lovely Irish folk tune, SLANE. The translation was made in 1905 from the original Gaelic by Mary E. Bryne (1880-1931), who was born in Ireland. She was a respected university level academic in Dublin.

My Life Flows On in Endless Song was composed, both the text and the tune, ENDLESS SONG, by Robert Lowry (1826-1899). Lowry was a preacher and scholar with a musical background from his childhood.

Spaseniye sodelal Op. 25, No. 5 was composed by Pavel Chesnokov (1877-1944). He was one of the most prolific composers of the Moscow Synodal School. These "hymns" were based on Russian Orthodox chant melodies. Old Church Slavonic is the language of the Russian Orthodox Church and liturgy and has the same relationship to modern Russian as Latin, the traditional language of the Catholic Church and liturgy, does to Italian. **A note for this time**: The Russian Orthodox Church was said to have been founded by St. Andrew, one of the 12 disciples, when he journeyed from Greece to what became Kiyv, Ukraine, but was then known as *Kiyvan Rus'* (land of the Rus'). The tune for *Live Into Hope*, TRURO, was composed by Charles Burney (1726-1814). Having apprenticed with a well-known English Baroque composer, Thomas Arne (1710-778), Burney was a music historian and composer. The words were written in 1976 for the United Presbyterian National Women's Meeting by Jane Parker Huber (1926-2008). She was a well-known Presbyterian hymn writer, having composed lyrics for more than 100 hymns. She also championed women's rights within her denomination.

The *Fugue in C Major* BuxWV 174, was composed by Dietrich Buxtehude (1637?-1707). Buxtehude's music and his skill as an organist had a profound effect on Bach. A true story is that Bach at age 20 walked (!) nearly 250 miles from Arnstadt to Lübeck just to hear and work with Buxtehude. That would be like walking from St. Pauls to Toledo, Ohio.


