
PRAYER OF CONFESSION

SCRIPTURE

Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

`And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,

are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

for from you shall come a ruler

who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. 





UPDATE ON 2025 PHASE II CONSTRUCTION PLANS TO "EXPAND AND ELEVATE SAINT PAULS' OPENNESS"

On October 20, our members unanimously and joyfully approved moving forward with Phase II of our long-awaited capital construction project. In disciplined planning and thoughtful review since 2016, the endorsed final work phase will make our entire public building complex more welcoming and fully accessible through the installation of a five-stop elevator and a beautiful open-air courtyard with a new north-end building access ramp.

Project general contractor Bulley & Andrews, St. Pauls owner's rep Lorne Frank, and architect Larry Kearns have met regularly to lay out a work plan for 2025. To maximize efficiency and minimize costs, work on the exterior and interior will happen concurrently from March through early November. The planned schedule for the phases of work is summarized in the following table:

TODAY'S MUSIC

Prélude sur l'Introït de l'Épiphanie (Prelude on the Introit for the Epiphany) Op13 was composed in 1961 by Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986). Duruflé took the chant melody *Ecce advenit dominator Dominus* (Behold! The Lord is coming!), which is from the *Mass for the Epiphany*. Duruflé uses chant as an inspiration for many of his works, especially his setting of *Requiem*.

The text for *Brightest and Best* was written in 1811 by Reginald Heber (1783-1826). Although born in England to a wealthy and educated family, he spent his final years working tirelessly with the poor as Bishop of Calcutta, India. He translated his first poem from Latin to English at age 7. He composed 57 hymns, including *Holy, Holy, Holy*. The tune, MORNING STAR, was composed in 1892 by James P. Harding (1850-1911). Also of English birth, for 35 years he was the organist at St. Andrews Church, Islington, London. He composed many church anthems and was noted especially for his anthems for children's choirs.

We Three Kings of Orient Are employs a text and music composed in 1857 by John H. Hopkins (1820-1891). Hopkins was one of 12 children of immigrant parents. He helped his father manage the Vermont Espiscopalian Institute.

Symbiosis was composed in 2023 by Kris Hansen (b. 1995). The music expresses a collective experience of support. Raised, baptized and confirmed at St. Pauls, Kris is a member of our St. Arbucks Quartet. He is an active singer, music producer, composer, trumpet player, and keyboard player in his own group, Semi-Cycle. He also performs regularly with other bands, including The Walters, Kweku Collins and Othersides.

Be Thou My Vision is a lovely Irish folk tune, SLANE. The translation was made in 1905 from the original Gaelic by Mary E. Bryne (1880-1931), who was born in Ireland. She was a respected university level academic in Dublin.

O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright is a famous German tune, Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern, composed in 1599 by Philipp Nicolai (1446–1608). Catherine Winkworth (1827–1878) translated the German. Having been raised in Dresden, she was well known for her translation of German chorales.

John Weaver (1937-2021) composed our *Epiphany Alleluias* in 1968. He was also the Chair of the Organ Department at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia from 1972 to 2003, the same position at The Juilliard School from 1987 to 2004, and was also Organist and Director of Music at Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City from 1970-2005. The text comes from the Propers for the Epiphany Sunday.

As With Gladness Those of Old is set to the tune DIX, which was composed by W. Chatterton Dix (1837–1898). Mr. Dix also composed the original lyrics. He was a Scottish insurance company manager who also published a number of volumes of hymns.

Joy to the World was composed by George Frideric Handel (1685-1759), who also composed *Messiah*, and was adapted as a hymn by Lowell Mason (1792-1872). For his contributions, Mason is often referred to as the father of American church music. Brendan Henry based his adaptation on the arrangement by Juju Song (b. 1976). She is a native Japanese musician who fell in love with jazz at age 12 and moved to New York City at 18. In addition to composing music for albums, she also has scored music for films.

ABOUT ST. PAULS

Making a Joyful Sound in the City!

St. Pauls UCC has a vibrant history in the city of Chicago. Founded in 1843, we are one of the city's oldest churches. In 1989, we became one of America's first congregations to declare ourselves "Open and Affirming" of LGBTQ+ people.
