

TODAY'S MUSIC

Singer-songwriter Sam Cooke (1941-1964) composed *A Change Is Gonna Come* in 1963. It was released on his album *Ain't That Good News* in February 1964. The song was inspired by events in Cooke's life, notably when he, his wife and friends were turned away from a Whites-only hotel in Louisiana. Sadly, Cooke was shot and killed at a motel in December 1964 in an incident that today would have raised questions regarding race vs. protection of property.

Jubilate Deo a 8, composed by Giovanni Gabrieli (1567-1612), a Venetian by birth, is closely associated with the Basilica of San Marco. His uncle, Andreas Gabrieli (c. 1532-1585), served as organist at San Marco and also as Giovanni's principal teacher. Following his uncle's death, Giovanni became organist at the Basilica and greatly advanced the long-renowned practice of music within its gilded walls. Andreas and Giovanni Gabrieli helped promulgate the polychoral style of sacred music that featured multiple choirs of voices and instruments. This Venetian style influenced many composers of the time, making its way to Germany in the music of Heinrich Schütz, Michael Praetorius and Hans Leo Hassler. The composition Jubilate Deo is in eight voices and is a shining example of contrapuntal mastery and sensitive evocation of the text.

O God Beyond All Praising is by Gustav Holst (1874–1934). The tune is called THAXTED, which is the main theme of the Jupiter movement from Holst's *The Planets*. It is truly a majestic hymn. Thaxted is the village where Holst grew up. Ralph Vaughan Williams adapted *Thaxted* as a hymn. The author of our text is Michael A. Perry (1942–1996). He began studies as a physicist and changed to theology.

Tobias Clausnitzer (c. 1619–1684) wrote the original German text in 1663 for *We Have Gathered Jesus Dear*. He became a chaplain to a Swedish regiment and was later Kapellmeister at St. Thomaskirche in Leipzig, the church that Bach would eventually serve. The English translation was made by Madeleine Forell Marshall (b. 1946). A respected academic who began her studies at St. Olaf College, she is now on the faculty of the Claremont School of Theology in California. The tune, LIEBSTER JESU, was composed in 1664 by Johann Rodolf Ahle (1625–1673). Educated at Erfurt University, he was well known as an organist, but beyond that little is known about his life.

The Chapel Choir performed *Hive of Frightened Bees* as part of a concert on October 27, 2025 that addressed the scourge of gun violence in our country. The text to A Hive of Frightened Bees was adapted from the poem "A Hope for Change" by Taylor Huntley. Huntley was a student at Arvada West High School in Arvada. Colorado, when the news broke of the school shooting in Parkland, Florida. During the same week, there was a threat written in one of the bathrooms at her own school. Rattled by the news and her own school's situation, Taylor took the opportunity to express her feelings in a poem as part of her English class. Her choir director, Chris Maunu, shared the poem on social media where I discovered it and reached out about the possibility of setting an adaptation of it. This soon evolved into a commission and a collaboration, resulting in the final work presented here. The music is shaped with the hope of honoring Taylor's words while also reshaping them slightly – adding breathing and heartbeats to elicit those feelings of panic, fear, and anxiety that so many American students live with on a daily basis in our era of recurring mass school shootings. -Andrea Ramsey

The text for *We Limit Not the Truth of God* was authored by George Rawson (1807–1889). He was born in Leeds, England, and became a lay minister in the Congregational Church. Professionally a solicitor, he penned more than 40 hymn texts. *OLD 22nd* is an unattributed hymn from the *Anglo-Genevan Psalter* of 1556. The number 22 means that the tune was used to set Psalm 22 in the Psalter.

Claudio Monteverdi (1567-1643), the composer of *Adoramus te, Christe*, holds the unrivaled position as the most important Italian composer of the 17th century. His achievements steered the course of music in ways and directions still felt today. *Adoramus te, Christe, SV289*, is a six-voice motet published in 1620 as part of a collection assembled by Giulio Cesare Bianchi (1590-1661). Bianchi had known Monteverdi in Mantua where the latter served the Duke of Mantua. This setting is notable for its mood of great reverence and the dialogue Monteverdi creates between the upper and lower voices.

The text for *My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less* was written in 1834 by Edward Mote (1797–1874). British-born Mote wrote a number of hymn texts after a spiritual awakening as a result of the preaching of an evangelical preacher. He also authored a number of Christian pamphlets. SOLID ROCK was composed in 1863 by the prolific hymn writer William Bradbury (1816–1868) who was raised on his father's farm in Maine. He developed a love for music as a child and by age 15 began playing the organ in church. Among the best known of his hymns is the children's hymn, *Jesus Loves Me, This I Know.*

The Lord Bless You and Keep You was composed in 1900 by Peter Christian Lutkin, (1858–1931). He was the founder and first Dean of the School of Music at Northwestern University in 1895. He was organist at St. Clement's Church, as well as one of the founders of the American Guild of Organists. Along with F. Melius Christiansen at St. Olaf College, Lutkin was one of the leaders of the American a capella choral movement in the early part of the 20th century. Kurt R. Hansen's maternal grandfather, John Mahard Rosborough, received his Bachelor of Music degree in 1905 at Northwestern under Dean Lutkin and was his first accompanist. This benediction was composed while Kurt's grandfather was a student of Lutkin. The text is known as "the priestly benediction." These are the words Moses was commanded to use when blessing Aaron and his sons before the completion of the tabernacle.

Grand Dialogue was composed by Louis Marchand (1669-1732), a French organist and harpsichord player. Born into a family of organists and considered a prodigy, he became one of only four organists for the king of France. In a colorful side note, there was a musical duel arranged in 1717 in Dresden between Bach and Marchand. The court in Dresden had offered a substantial monetary prize to the winner. The day of the contest people arrived, Bach arrived, but no Marchand. He evidently fled Dresden having heard of Bach's musical prowess. The duel never took place.
