
SERVING OF THE BREAD AND CUP

SCRIPTURE

Isaiah 6:1-10

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty, and the hem of his robe filled the temple. 



IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as St. Pauls. If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 73. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age 70 ½, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 73. You cannot make QCDs from your 401K; it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor. TODAY'S MUSIC

John Ireland (1879-1962) composed our Prelude, *Intrada*, the first movement of his *Miniature Suite*, in 1904. He is among the Victorian composers from England that included Stainer, Parry and Stanford. He is probably best known for his many songs. Benjamin Britten was one of his students. Although Ireland's training was nearly exclusively English, he was also influenced by French impressionist composers.

Our Introit, *Here, O My Lord, I See Thee Face to Face* is a chant from the Latin, ADORO TE DEVOTE, from the 13th century attributed to the Benedictines at the monastery at Solesmes, France. Its English text is by Horace Bonar (1808–1889), a Scottish minister who wrote many poetic hymn texts. This setting is especially appropriate for a communion Sunday.

To You, O God, All Creatures Sing is a text that was adapted by Sister Miriam Therese Winter (b. 1938). She is a Catholic theologian and Medical Mission Sister who has worked in a number war-torn areas, including Ethiopia and Cambodia. The German hymn tune LASST UNS ERFREUEN dates from 1623, and was first found in a hymnal published in Cologne, Germany. It is recognisable to us as the same tune as our *Festival Doxology*.

The tune and text for *Let Us Break Bread Together*, the well known communion hymn, are unattributed but became widely known after being printed in 1926 in *The Second Book of Negro Spirituals*, which was currated and compiled by the famous poet, James Weldon Johnson, and equally prominent composer, J. Rosamond Johnson. The history of the text and tune probably predates the Civil War.

The text for *Bring Many Names* was written by Brian A. Wren (b. 1936). A major British contributor to contemporary hymn writing, he was a pastor of a Congregational Church in Essex. WESTCHASE was composed in 1989 by Carlton R. Young (b.1926). He served in World War II and became a teacher, editor, composer and conductor. He edited two editions of the *United Methodist Hymnal*.

Ninye otpushaiyeshi, commonly known in Latin as the *nunc dimittis*, or the Song of Simeon, was composed by Alexandr Grechaninov (1864-1956). He is primarily remembered for his liturgical music for the Russian Orthodox Church. This is a setting of Simeon's prayer upon seeing the child Jesus. God promised Simeon that he would live to see the Messiah. Grechaninov moved from the Soviet Union to France in 1925, immigrated to the United States in 1939, and spent the rest of his life here. Old Church Slavonic has a similar relationship to modern Russian as Latin does to Italian.

George Matterling added the *Gloria Patri* in the style of Grechaninov. While the Gloria Patri is a prescribed response in liturgical western churches to biblical readings or anthems on biblical texts, it is not part of the liturgy in the Russian Orthodox Church. **A note for this time** - The Russian Orthodox Church was said to be founded by St. Andrew, one of the twelve disciples, when he journeyed from Greece to what became Kiyv, Ukraine, but was then known as *Kiyvan Rus'* (land of the Rus').

Battle Hymn of the Republic hardly needs much of an introduction. The words were written by abolitionist Julia Ward Howe (1819-1910) in 1861 at the outbreak of our Civil War. Its words have inspired generations here and beyond our shores. The tune is attributed to William Steffe (1830-1890), but is thought to be an American camp meeting song, *John Brown's Body*, combined with another song *Oh Brothers!*

Billy Taylor (1921-2010) was a great African American jazz pianist, composer, broadcaster and educator. From 1994, he was the Artistic Director for Jazz at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. He also worked tirelessly to raise funds to replace homes of older jazz musicians in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina. *I Wish I Knew How It Would Feel to Be Free* was composed in 1963 at the height of the civil rights movement and became an unofficial anthem of that movement. The New York Times called it "one of the greatest songs of the sixties."
