



ST. PAULS WOMEN'S HISTORY – BARBARA SCHUENEMANN (1865-1933) After the tragic sinking of the Schuenemann Christmas Tree Ship in 1912 with all hands including "Captain Santa Claus," Herman, his widow, Barbara and her daughters, Elsie, Hazel and Pearl continued their family business to bring Christmas trees to the families of Chicago from their dock on Clark Street and the Chicago River. Each November for the next 20 years, Barbara travelled to northern Michigan, hired a crew to cut, bundle and ship trees by schooner to waiting German families riverside. Due to their shared spirit of generosity, these active St. Pauls women donated Christmas trees to many indigent families and groups, including the Uhlich Children's Home (now UCAN). Though Barbara died in 1933, her daughters continued the enterprise for many years thereafter. These are St. Pauls women you should know.

Morning Coffee as a Small Miracle!

Tenderly embrace and cherish your coffee as it is really a wonder and a testament to the human craving for caffeine. Globally, about 25 million people are involved in the coffee business— yes, this includes your barista— and at each juncture, the coffee supply chain is currently subject to volatility.

Volatility means market instability, and for the coffee bean supply market, this comes from exaggerated weather (particularly in Brazil), a diminishing rural labor supply, increasing tariffs for Mexican beans, and changing transportation routes and costs. Each segment is experiencing profound changes, so one should expect shortages and/or substantially increasing costs, so be prepared!

TODAY'S MUSIC

We are pleased that our Intergenerational Orchestra has chosen to present music to dovetail with part of our Special Music Theme; **HEAR Ye + Bach**. This morning, they will play music of **EAR**: English, **A**ustrian, and **R**ussian.

Prelude: Franz Josef Haydn (1732-1809) and W. A. Mozart were not only the leading composers of the Classical era, they were also good friends, musical admirers and fellow Masons. Haydn wrote 104 symphonies and is considered "the Father of the Symphony." He spent most of working life as music director for the wealthy Esterhazy family, living at their estate in Hungary. After the death of his patron Nikolaus Esterhazy in 1790, Haydn was free to travel to Vienna and London, where he was the most celebrated composer in Europe. His *"Surprise" Symphony No.94* was written in 1791 for concerts given in 1792 during his first visit to London.

Anthem: John Ireland (1879-1962) composed *Greater Love Hath No Man* in 1912. This anthem is among his most often performed works. He is among the Victorian composers from England that included Stainer, Parry and Stanford. He is probably best known for his many songs. Benjamin Britten was one of his students. Although his training was nearly exclusively English, Ireland was also influenced by French impressionist composers as well. Today we offer and dedicate it prayerfully to the Ukrainian people and their struggle for freedom and peace.

Offertory: Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) was the leading English composer of the early 20th century. His *Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis* was written for string orchestra in 1910. It is based on a hymn tune by Tudor composer Thomas Tallis (1505-1585). One critic was "never quite sure whether one is listening to something very old or very new, but that is just what makes this Fantasia so delightful to listen to."

Prayer of St. Patrick was composed in 1982 by Sir John Rutter (b. 1945). It is meaningful to share this benediction the day before St. Patrick's Day. He is the patron saint of Ireland, and revered by many not of Irish heritage in Chicago as well. In addition to the Catholic Church, St. Patrick is celebrated in the Anglican Church, the Eastern Orthodox Church, and the Lutheran Church. John Rutter's music was introduced to this country by Mel Olson, who was the Director of Music at Dundee Presbyterian Church in Omaha, Nebraska, where our music director, Kurt Hansen, grew up and sang in his choirs.

Postlude: Nicolai Rimsky-Korsakov (1844-1908) was one of the Russian composers known as "The Five." He was a professor of composition at the Saint Petersburg Conservatory, as well as an officer in the Imperial Russian Navy. His best-known orchestral works include *Scheherezade* and *Capriccio Espagnol*, but most of his works use Russian folk songs and stories. *The Snow Maiden* (1881) is one of his several operas. Act 3 opens with the "*Dance of the Tumblers*."

ABOUT ST. PAULS

Making a Joyful Sound in the City!

St. Pauls UCC has a vibrant history in the city of Chicago. Founded in 1843, we are one of the city's oldest churches. In 1989, we became one of America's first congregations to declare ourselves "Open and Affirming" of LGBTQ+ people.
