if we will not be your people.



SCRIPTURE

Luke 13:1-9

Some people came up and told Jesus about the Galileans Pilate had killed while they were at worship, mixing their blood with the blood of the sacrifices on the altar. He asked them, "Do you think those murdered Galileans suffered in this way because they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? Not at all. Unless you repent, turn to God, you too will die. 



ST. PAULS WOMEN'S HISTORY – RUTH KLINKE BAUR (1909-2014)

Ruth Klinke Baur began working in the church office as a teenager and for more than fifty years was synonymous with the St. Pauls church office. She was the secretary for five senior pastors: Pister, Scherger, Grauer, Trost and Henry. During those years, she was the secretary to the senior pastor, the office secretary and the financial secretary, usually working six and sometimes seven days a week. Additionally, she helped run the church school, organized and decorated for special events, and oversaw everything going on in the building. She is largely responsible for the current church archive as she kept everything, and in her free time typed up a whole file drawer of index cards recording baptism, confirmation and wedding information. She married Erv Baur, a church member and head usher for many years. At the end of her life, she lived at what was St. Paul's House, now Paul House and Health Care Center, where she celebrated her 101st birthday with many St. Pauls members before finally passing away at age 105.

BUILDING UPDATE - ROOM NUMBERS AT ST. PAULS

St. Pauls is in the process of converting from room names to numbers. When construction is completed, formal signage will replace the temporary signage. Major locations, i.e., Sanctuary (115), Social Hall (015), Kitchen (010), Gym (009) will commonly use those titles, but their numbers are posted. Numbering begins at the Fullerton entrance (largely inaccessible during asbestos abatement and construction) and rises to the Kemper Place doorway: Main Level (100s), Upper Level (200s), Lower Level (000s). Yes many rooms have cycled through many names, and we'd love to catalogue the ones you remember using. Thank you for your flexibility.

Climate Change Adaptation

Lee Zeldin, the current Environmental Protection Agency administrator, has recommended ignoring the EPA's finding that climate change poses a danger to public health. Presto! Just like that firestorms, droughts, floods, heat waves, happen just because.

The new EPA policy is to "adapt" to climate change, i.e., containing the impacts of weather extremes through better infrastructure design; shoring against sea-level rise through physical containment, and resettling people living in vulnerable communities. Adaptation also includes fighting against biodiversity loss and food and water insecurity. Sounds good, but where is the money and leadership if the idea is to diminish the EPA and related institutions?

TODAY'S MUSIC

TWO VERSETS on Brother James Air was composed in 1991 by Noel Rawsthorne (1929-2019). Rawsthorne was a well-known British concert organist and composer of music for choirs and organ. He began his lifelong commitment to liturgical music at age 8 when he became a chorister in the choir of the Liverpool Cathedral. He went on to become the cathedral organist in 1955. Among his teachers was Marcel Dupré.

The text for *O Love How Vast, How Flowing Free* is a free translation of an anonymous 15th century Latin poem. The tune, DEO GRACIAS, is also known as AGINCOURT, which is an English ballad that also dates from the 15th century.

Come O Fount of Every Blessing, to the tune NETTLETON, is from the rich American tradition of the Sacred Harp hymnals, specifically *Wyeth's Repository of Sacred Music*. The text was written by Robert Robinson (1735-1790), who began his professional life as an apprentice to a hairdresser before committing himself to a religious life.

The text for *Amazing Grace* is by John Newton (1725-1807), a slave ship captain who became an Anglican clergyman and fervent abolitionist. He once said that writing this text saved his soul. The tune, NEW BRITAIN, is most likely an African American spiritual and was first published in 1829.

The text and music to *I've Got A Feeling (Everything Is Gonna Be All Right)* is unattributed and listed as "traditional." It is clear that this song is another example of the rich spiritual music of the Black church. The first printed occurrence is from hymnals dating to 1982.

The tune for **Brother James Air**, MAROSA, was composed by James Leith Macbeth Bain (1860–1925). He was a healer and mystic known simply as Brother James. This arrangement was composed in 1934 by Gordon Jacob (1895–1984), an English composer and professor at the Royal College of Music in London for more than 40 years. He was known for his orchestrations of composers from Byrd to Elgar and Noël Coward. The text is a portico version of Psalm 23 taken from the *Scottish Psalter of 1650*.

My Song Is Love Unknown is a hymn text written in 1664 by Samuel Crossman (1623-1684). Very little is known about his life beyond the fact that he was clergy. A notable observation is how clearly this text speaks to us across four centuries. The tune, RHOSYMEDRE, was composed in 1840 by John David Edwards (1806-1885). He was an Anglican priest and the tune name is taken from one of the parishes he served in Wales.

From the Top of My Head was composed by Roy Hargrove (1969-2018). In his all too short life, Hargrove became one of the greats in the jazz performing and recording world. He was a composer whose principal instruments were trumpet and flugelhorn. In addition to jazz, he also performed and recorded hip-hop, R & B, gospel, funk, and alternative rock. Born in Waco, Texas, he attended the Berklee College of Music in Boston for one year, but a very active performing and recording career ended his formal training. He made and contributed to numerous recordings. His 14-year battle with kidney disease ended with his death in 2018.

St. Pauls UCC has a vibrant history in the city of Chicago. Founded in 1843, we are one of the city's oldest churches. In 1989, we became one of America's first congregations to declare ourselves "Open and Affirming" of LGBTQ+ people.
