SCRIPTURE Nancy Hays

Luke 19:20-44

As he approached Bethphage and Bethany at the hill called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.' " So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus, and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. Now as he was approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying,

"Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!"

Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

As he came near and saw the city, he wept over it, saying, "If you, even you, had only recognized on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes. Indeed, the days will come upon you when your enemies will set up ramparts around you and surround you and hem you in on every side. They will crush you to the ground, you and your children within you, and they will not leave within you one stone upon another, because you did not recognize the time of your visitation from God."





Silicosis Redux

Executive orders were signed this week by President Trump in support of the coal industry:

- 1. To "repeal" legislation that discriminates against coal production;
- 2. To open Federal lands to coal and other types of mining;
- 3. To explore whether coal plants can be used to power AI facilities;
- 4. To extend the life of old coal plants by waving air pollution restrictions.

Coal generates 16% of America's energy. It is the most polluting of all energy sources, as fine dust is thrown off when produced, transported and used.

Dedicated coal trains and barges are common in Chicago. The increased traffic will surely affect the city, even if the new coal seams are in Wyoming.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Processional was composed in 1964 by William Mathias (1934-1992). He was a Welsh composer who composed opera, chamber music, choral music, and works for orchestra. He was a child prodigy, beginning piano at age 3 and composing at age 5. One of his best known works, *Let the People Praise Thee, O Lord* was written on commission for the wedding of Prince Charles and Princess Diana in 1982. It is an anthem that our Chancel Choir has often sung in worship.

There is very little that can be said about *Ho-Ho-Hosanna*. Both the melody and words, which are perfect for Palm Sunday, are unattributed. Perhaps it is enough just to say that it is fun, and who says a hymn can't be fun?

Hosanna! Loud Hosanna is a rousing Palm Sunday text written in 1873 by Jeanette Threlfall (1821-1880). She led a difficult life. Orphaned at a very early age, she suffered an accident which left her an invalid for the rest of her days. She became a lay minister to many and exuded grace. The tune, ELLACOMBE, unattributed and of German origin, was first published in a hymnal in 1784. In the 19th century, the tune was named for a village in Devonshire.

Give Me Oil in My Lamp is a traditional Quaker song arranged in 2000 by Joseph M. Martin. He is a native of North Carolina and has a wide and varied musical career as a composer, arranger, conductor, pianist, university level academic, and recording producer. He is currently on the faculty of Concordia University in Austin, Texas, and is also on the editorial staff of Hal Leonard Publications. This setting features a swinging energy.

The text for *Child of Blessing, Child of Promise* was written in 1981 by a UCC pastor and teacher of theology, Ronald Cole-Turner (b. 1948). The tune, STUTTGART, was composed in 1715 by Christian Friederich Witt (1660-1716). Witt completed a huge hymnal, *Psalmodia Sacra*, the year before his death. Of the 774 hymns (!!!), he composed nearly 100. He was Kapellmeister of the Gotha court in Stuttgart at the same time that Bach was in Leipzig, just 300 miles north. An interesting side note is that Nathan Laube, world renowned organist and friend of St. Pauls, was until recently on the organ faculty at the Hochschule für Musick in Stuttgart. He has returned to the faculty at the Eastman School of Music.

Hosanna to the Son of David, which is also known as Palm Sunday Processional, was composed in 2016 by the team of Daniel Greig and Jon Paige. Daniel Greig is on the faculty of the University of Detroit Mercy as a choral director and musical director of liturgical studies on campus. He has conducted more than 100 musicals. Jon Paige has had numerous works published and performed.

My Song Is Love Unknown is a hymn text written in 1664 by Samuel Crossman (1623-1684). Very little is known about his life beyond the fact that he was clergy. It is clear, however, that this text speaks to us across over four centuries. The tune, RHOSYMEDRE, was composed in 1840 by John David Edwards (1806-1885). He was an Anglican priest and the tune name is taken from one of the parishes he served in Wales.

In his all too brief life, Moses Hogan (1957–2003) continued and added to the great tradition of spiritual arrangement that includes William Dawson. He recorded a number of compact discs and wrote solo arrangements for such singers as Kathleen Battle. *Ride On, King Jesus* is a well-known spiritual that was made memorable across decades of St. Pauls Palm Sunday services by the Chancel Choir's beloved long-term bass soloist, Ron McCowan. This arrangement by Moses Hogan was a gift to the choir in Ron's honor from Jana O'Brien and Wayne Parman. Mr. Hogan was commissioned by St. Pauls to write *I Gotta Home in-a Dat Rock* in honor of Ron McCowan's 25 years of service to this congregation.

The text for *All Glory Laud and Honor* is attributed to Theodulph, Bishop of Orléans (750-821). He was Italian by birth and was brought to the French Court by Charles the Great. The familiar translation we sing was written in 1854 by J.M. Neale (1818-1866), who translated many hymn texts into English, including *O Come, O Come Emmanuel*. He was a member of the British clergy and struggled with ill health his entire life. The tune name was dedicated to Theodulph at a later date. The tune was composed by German composer Melchior Teschner (1584-1635). One of the places he studied was in Wittenberg, the birthplace of the Lutheran faith.

I Expect to See Him is by Jessy Dixon (1938-2011), another gospel artist and composer with deep roots in Chicago. His music was beloved outside his own community and he received seven Grammy nominations in his career. He toured the world with Paul Simon after Mr. Simon heard him and the Jessy Dixon Singers at a concert at Radio City Music Hall in New York City. He also wrote music for artists as varied as Diana Ross and Cher.
