

John 20:1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Je sus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.





BUILDING UPDATE - ROOM NUMBERS AT ST. PAULS

St. Pauls is in the process of converting from room names to numbers. When construction is completed, formal signage will replace the temporary signage. Major locations, i.e., Sanctuary (115), Social Hall (015), Kitchen (010), Gym (009) will commonly use those titles, but their numbers are posted. Numbering begins at the Fullerton entrance (largely inaccessible during construction) and rises to the Kemper Place doorway: Main Level (100s), Upper Level (200s), Lower Level (000s). Building Jerusalem in Chicago's Pleasant Land William Blake's poem *Jerusalem* refers to "satanic" mills marring and polluting verdant land and bucolic rivers. It is our neighborhood!

It takes decades to remediate pollution. In some instances, remediation requires sophisticated engineering, ongoing testing, and the cooperation of many agencies with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Funds for this work were recently frozen by the Trump Administration. However, on April 14th, Federal Judge Mary S. McElroy ruled that funds for the Department of Interior, Department of Energy, and the EPA had been unlawfully frozen. She reasoned, "…agencies have 'narrower powers' to pause or terminate individual grants but not cases of vast economic and political significance."

The mental fight is unceasing. Civic coalitions are challenging the freezes and these cases are wending their way through the courts like a bucolic river reaching the Mississippi.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Richard Strauss (1864–1949) composed *Feierlicher Einzug der Ritter des Johanniterordens* (*Solemn Entry of the Knights of St. John*) in 1909. He is perhaps best known for his operas, which include *Elektra*, *Salome*, and *Der Rosenkavalier*, to name a few. His music gained popularity long after his death for the opening phrases of *Also sprach Zarathustra* (*Thus spake Zarathustra*) that was used for the movie score of *2001: A Space Odyssey. Feierlicher Einzug* is a majestic work originally scored for 15 (!) trumpets, four horns, four trombones, two tubas and timpani. It was composed and first performed in Dresden the same year as the composition of *Elektra* and was transcribed by Chip DeStefano specifically for St. Pauls.

The *Call to Worship* was composed in 1982 by John Rutter (b. 1945) who also composed the text based on psalms of praise. John Rutter's music was introduced to this country by Mel Olson, who was the Director of Music at Dundee Presbyterian Church in Omaha, Nebraska, where our music director grew up and sang in his choirs.

Christ the Lord Is Risen Today, tune EASTER HYMN or LYRA DAVIDICA, uses a text by Charles Wesley (1707-1788), the great Methodist theologian and hymnodist. The tune's composer is not known but is taken from a collection, *Lyra Davidica*; hence, one of the tune names. It is equally appropriate to sing this great Easter hymn on a day that has a real sense of resurrection for many at St. Pauls.

The text for *Morning Has Broken* was written by Elinor Farjeon (1881-1965), who also wrote children's books. The tune, BUNESSAN, we know so well is a Gaelic melody.

I Wander in Deep Thought (Jeg går i tusind Tanker) Op. 66 No. 18 was composed in 1896 by Edvard Grieg (1843-1907). Grieg is certainly the most famous of Norwegian composers and was equally famous in his lifetime as a pianist. His home, Troldhaugen, is in the same city of his birth, Bergen, Norway. It is visited by thousands of tourists each year. His most famous works are his Piano Concerto, Holberg Suite, and Peer Gynt. Interestingly, Grieg met Tchaikovsky in 1888 in St. Petersburg and they became good friends.

Bill Withers (1938-2020) composed and recorded *Lean On Me* in 1972. Withers was born and raised in Slab Fork, West Virginia, coal country. After moving to Los Angeles, he found himself missing the strong community ethic of his hometown even though he and his neighbors lived in real poverty. Over his career, he won three Grammy Awards, and had a documentary made about his life in 2009. He was

inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame (2015), the Songwriters Hall of Fame (2005), and this song was inducted into Grammy Hall of Fame.

The Creator Has a Master Plan was composed by Pharoah Sanders (1940-2022). He was born Farrell Sanders and changed his name after his conversion to Islam. He was a saxophonist known for creating "spiritual jazz" as well as exploring the overtones on the sax. The legendary saxophonist John Coltrane, who became a close friend of Sanders, recorded this work as an almost musical mantra and featured it on his testament album, A Love Supreme.

Worthy Is the Lamb is the final chorus of Messiah and sums up the triumphal message of Christ's resurrection. Although it is most often associated with Christmas, Messiah actually announces the victory of Christ over death. Handel composed the entire work in a two-week flurry of creativity in 1741. The final Amen is a fugue and begins rather modestly with only continuo, one cello, one bass, organ and a quartet of singers. There is a brief violin interlude before the entire choir, trumpets, timpani, and all other instruments storm the heavens in a very Baroque fashion, decoration on top of decoration.

Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885) wrote the text for *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven*. He wrote more than 120 hymn texts and was also the nephew of the famous poet William Wordsworth. The words are set to the famous Welsh tune, HYFRYDOL by Rowan Hugh Prichard (1811-1887), composed when he was only 19.

The *Hallelujah Chorus* is arguably the most often performed and well known of the works of George Frideric Handel (1685-1759). This chorus closes Part Two of *Messiah*. The tradition of standing for the *Hallelujah Chorus* dates to King George II standing at a performance in London. It isn't clear if, as tradition suggests, he was deeply moved or perhaps just needed to stand. No matter the reason, the tradition of standing for the *Hallelujah Chorus* is a long established way to honor Handel's genius and the victorious text.

Final from *Symphony No. 3* in *C Minor, Op. 78* was composed in 1886 by Camille Saint-Saëns (1835-1921), who was at the peak of his skills and popularity. It is most often referred to as *The Organ Symphony*, because of the prominent part composed for the organ. It is undoubtedly one of the most recorded of the Romantic French symphonic repertoire. The symphony was commissioned by the Royal Philharmonic Society in England. Saint-Saëns conducted the first performance in London and dedicated it to his recently deceased friend, Franz Liszt. The symphony requires a pipe organ of significant size to be heard over an entire romantic orchestra. Mark Mosley prepared this transcription.
