Numbering begins at the Fullerton entrance (largely inaccessible during construction) and rises to the Kemper Place doorway: Main Level (100s), Upper Level (200s), Lower Level (000s). Extensively trained in compassionate Christian caregiving, Stephen Ministers are matched confidentially with someone in our congregation who is going through a crisis, such as the death of a loved one, a diagnosis, a divorce, a job loss, etc. They meet with you once a week for an hour to offer support through listening, companionship and prayer. Every one of us could benefit from a Stephen Minister at some point in our lives.

TODAY'S MUSIC

The *Adagio for Strings* in B Flat Minor Op. 11 was composed in 1936 by American composer Samuel Barber (1910-1981). The original version was scored as the second movement for his string quartet and he created the full string orchestra version the same year. The *Adagio* was premiered in 1938 by Arturo Toscanini (1867-1957) and the NBC Radio Orchestra in a national broadcast. Toscanini also included the *Adagio* in the programming for his tour to South America in 1940. The *Adagio* is arguably the most well known and often performed of Barber's works. Barber even created a choral version in 1967 using the *Agnus Dei* text from the last portion of the Mass Ordinary. Many consider this work to be America's official music of mourning. It was a favorite of President Kennedy and was played at his funeral and those of many other luminaries. It has been popularized in film scores, including the 1986 movie *Platoon*. There is no "program" for the *Adagio*, but it has a deep sense of pathos, yearning, and inner passion that is a perfect foil for the Mozart *Requiem*.

The text for *Christ the Victorious* was written in 1982 for the Episcopalian 1982 Hymnal by Carl P. Daw, Jr (b. 1944). The text is a paraphrase of a portion of the Easter Orthodox memorial service. Daw was born in Louisville, Kentucky, the son of a Baptist minister. He holds a PhD in English literature, taught at the College of William and Mary, and in 1981 became an ordained priest in the Anglican Church. The hymn was composed in 1833 by Alexei F. Lvov (1799-1870). He was Russian born and educated and composed this hymn in one evening. Many will recognise the melody as part of the close of Tchaikovky's 1812 Overture, which celebrates the victory over the forces of Napoleon.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791) composed his setting of *Requiem* in the year of his death. Only two of the sections are complete versions of his composition, the opening INTROITUS (*Requiem aeternam*) and the *Lacrimosa*. All the other movements were completed by Mozart's student, Fanz Xavier Süssmayr (1766-1803) either from notes left by Mozart, or wholly created by Süssmayr in his master's style in the case of the *Sanctus* and *Benedictus*. The *Agnus Dei* was also composed by Süssmayr, but reprises part of Mozart's original composition of the opening movement for the final *Dona nobis pacem* (Grant us peace). Entire musicological books, stage plays, and a movie have been written about the *Requiem*, Mozart's final days, how much Süssmayr actually contributed, and even if it is proper to refer to it as Mozart's *Requiem*. In a way, these arguments mirror debates about the authenticity of Shakespeare as author of all of the plays attributed to him. Whether arguing about Mozart's *Requiem* or the plays of Shakespeare, what cannot be denied is the brilliance of the work and the historically lasting impact of those works of art. The text of the *Requiem* is taken from the *Liber Usualis*, the *Usual Book*, which contains all the Latin texts and chants for

common mass services. The *Missa pro defunctis* (Mass for the dead) text leans heavily into sorrow and judgement with a deep sense of piety AND with a secure belief of life beyond death.

It is worth noting that the final words of the **Requiem** speak of eternal light (Lux aeterna) and the plea to God for peace (Dona nobis pacem) for the departed and for all believers. Here pronouns become very important. *Dona eis requiem* (Grant THEM rest) is changed in the final movement to *Dona nobis pacem* (Grant US peace.) The requiem mass is offered for the departed and also with assuredness for all believers.
