SCRIPTURE Jake Gentzen

Acts 16: 16-24

One day, on our way to the place of prayer, a slave girl ran into us. She was a psychic and, with her fortunetelling, made a lot of money for her owners. She started following Paul around, calling everyone's attention to us by yelling out, "These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you a way of salvation." She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, "I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it was gone, just like that.

When her owners saw that their lucrative little business was suddenly bankrupt, they went after Paul and Silas, roughed them up and dragged them into the market square. Then the police arrested them and pulled them into a court with the accusation, "These men are disturbing the peace—dangerous Jewish agitators subverting our Roman law and order." By this time the crowd had turned into a restless mob out for blood.

The judges went along with the mob, had Paul and Silas's clothes ripped off and ordered a public beating. After beating them black-and-blue, they threw them into jail, telling the jailkeeper to put them under heavy guard so there would be no chance of escape. He did just that—threw them into the maximum security cell in the jail and clamped leg irons on them.

About midnight, Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was an earthquake, so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself. He supposed that the prisoners had escaped, meaning he was as good as dead anyway. Paul stopped him: "Do not harm yourself! We're all still here! Nobody's run away!"

The jailer got a torch and ran inside. Badly shaken, he collapsed in front of Paul and Silas. He led them out of the jail and asked, "Sirs, what do I have to do to be saved, to really live?" They said, "Put your entire trust in the Master Jesus. Then you'll live as you were meant to live—and everyone in your house included!"

They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. They never did get to bed that night. The jailer made them feel at home, dressed their wounds, and then—he couldn't wait till morning!—was baptized, he and everyone in his family. There in his home, he had food set out for a festive meal. It was a night to remember: He and his entire family had put their trust in God; everyone in the house rejoiced.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Yes, there are other beautiful movements, in addition to the famous *Toccata* which we hear on Christmas Eve, from the *Symphony V in F Major*, Op. 42, No 1. The symphony was composed in 1879 by Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937). This reflective *Adagio in C Major* is the lyric movement that precedes the fiery *Toccata*. It also shows off the warmer tones available and the huge range of colors of larger instruments.. Widor, along with Louis Vierne (1870-1937), were the great French Romantic symphonists for the organ. Vierne held the post of Organist at the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris and Widor held the same position at St. Sulpice, also in Paris.

Our Introit, *Alleluia*, is by Henry Purcell (1659-1695). Purcell was one of the great English Baroque composers and spent his entire short life in London. His father was a musician and singer in the King's court. After his father's death, Henry was raised and encouraged musically by his uncle. Among his famous works is the opera *Dido and Aeneas*. His music is used in film scores and his most popular work is his *Canon in C*.

A Mighty Fortress Is Our God is arguably the greatest Martin Luther (1483-1546) hymn and it encapsulates the theology of the Lutheran Church. The tune name, EIN FESTE BURG, are the first three words of the original German text. Luther's original version is almost dance-like in rhythm. The processional hymn presents a more majestic march.

Come Ye Sinners Poor and Needy, to the tune RESTORATION, is mined from the wonderful early 19th century American shape-note hymnals, including *Southern Harmony*. Its composer and lyricist are unknown, but it was first published in 1835. The melody is characterized by a folk-like swing.

When You Believe was composed in 1998 by Stephen Schwartz (b. 1948) for the DreamWorks movie, *The Prince of Egypt*. The movie is based on the Book of Exodus in the Hebrew Bible. The song, which became famous as a pop single, is a duet recording by Mariah Carey and Whitney Houston, also recorded in 1998. It received the Academy Award for Best Original Song in 1999. The text imagines both the fears and faith of the people as they leave Egypt for the Promised Land.

The composition of *Judas Maccabeus* (1746) came five years after George Friderick Handel (1685-1759) penned *Messiah*. Hebrew Bible stories were very popular as concert dramas, more properly called "oratorios," in England. It relates the story of

Chanukah, the festival of lights, found in the Apocryphal book of First Maccabees. In the story, Judah Maccabee fights against the idol worship commanded by King Antiochus. Judah cleanses the altar in the Temple. This *Hallelujah Amen Chorus*, often fondly referred to in the musical community as the "Jewish Hallelujah Chorus," is the finale of *Judas Maccabeus* and expresses the thanksgiving of the Israelites. Of some local interest, KAM-Isaiah Israel Synagogue in Hyde Park sponsors a "Do-it-Yourself" *Judas Maccabeus* each Chanukah season.

Both the text and tune, WATERLIFE, to *I Was There to Hear Your Borning Cry* were composed by John Yivisaker (1937-2017). Because of the number of hymns he wrote, he was called the "Bob Dylan of the Lutheran Church." Although Minnesota was his home, he travelled widely and was noted for his self-effacing personality.

Danielbelle Hall (1938-2000) was a deeply committed Gospel artist who sought to evangelize through her singing and composing. She formed her own group, Danielbelle's, and was also a member of Andraé Crouch's Disciples. She recorded several solo albums and toured around the world. *Keep Holding On* was composed and recorded in the 1980s.
