SCRIPTURE David Faulkner

John 10:1-14 The Message

Let me set this before you as plainly as I can. If a person climbs over or through the fence of a sheep pen instead of going through the gate, you know he's up to no good—a sheep rustler! The shepherd walks right up to the gate. The gatekeeper opens the gate to him and the sheep recognize his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he gets them all out, he leads them and they follow because they are familiar with his voice. They won't follow a stranger's voice but will scatter because they aren't used to the sound of it.

"I am the Gate for the sheep. All those others are up to no good—sheep rustlers, every one of them. But the sheep didn't listen to them. I am the Gate. Anyone who goes through me will be cared for—will freely go in and out, and find pasture. A thief is only there to steal and kill and destroy. I came so they can have real and eternal life, more and better life than they ever dreamed of.

"I am the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd puts the sheep before himself, sacrifices himself if necessary. A hired man is not a real shepherd. The sheep mean nothing to him. He sees a wolf come and runs for it, leaving the sheep to be ravaged and scattered by the wolf. He's only in it for the money. The sheep don't matter to him. I am the Good Shepherd. I know my own sheep and my own sheep know me. In the same way, the Father knows me and I know the Father. I lay down my life for the sheep."



BUILDING UPDATE - ROOM NUMBERS AT ST. PAULS

St. Pauls is in the process of converting from room names to numbers. When construction is completed, formal signage will replace the temporary signage. TODAY'S MUSIC

Liebster Jesu, wir sind hier, Dearest Jesus, We Are Here and Wer nur den lieben Gott lässt walten, We Who Only Let Loving God Rule, are chorale preludes, which is a compositional genre where the composer creates an "arrangement" using a well-known melody as a theme. The chorale, hymn, and melody of Liebster Jesu was composed by Benjamin Schmolk (1672-1737). Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) thought so highly of this chorale that he set it for organ four times. Wer nur ... was also composed in the 17th century by Georg Neumark (1621-1681). Randall Thompson, (1899-1984), who composed our Offertory anthem, set his own versions of these two great hymns.

This Is the Day uses a folk melody and unattributed words from Fiji. It was first published in 1967 in an Australian hymnal. It lends itself to be sung in a call and response style.

Come O Fount of Every Blessing, to the tune NETTLETON, is from the rich American tradition of the Sacred Harp hymnals, specifically *Wyeth's Repository of Sacred Music*. The text was written by Robert Robinson (1735-1790), who began his professional life as an apprentice to a hairdresser before committing himself to a religious life.

She's Got the Whole World in Her Hands employs the traditional spiritual known by so many with the addition of the same inclusive language that our pastors often use for God during their prayers. The beautiful words of All Things Bright and Beautiful, by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895), are included and enhance the meaning. Stacey Nordmeyer provided this arrangement and also added new music. She has been composing and publishing for more than 35 years. She holds the position of General Manager, Choral Publication at Hal Leonard and Shawnee Press.

Jesus Loves Me This I Know is one of the first hymns many children learn. The words are both simple and profound. They were written in 1859 by Anna Bartlett Warner (1824-1915). Born in New York City, she wrote many hymn texts and collaborated with her sister Sarah on novels. The composer of the tune, JESUS LOVES ME, is William Bradbury (1816–1868). He penned this sweet melody in 1861 and also composed the famous hymn, *Just As I Am*.

Keep Us in Your Heart was composed by Tony Payne. Mr. Payne retired in 2024 as Music Professor Emeritus at Wheaton College Conservatory of Music, where he had taught since 1983. He holds degrees from Wheaton, Bowling Green State University, and a doctorate in composition from Northwestern University. He has published numerous works.

My Shepherd Will Supply My Need employs a text by the great English poet and hymnodist, Issac Watts (1674 1748). Watts set the entire book of Psalms poetically, many of which we still sing today, notably Our God Our Help in Ages Past. RESIGNATION is another hymn melody whose composer is unattributed, and is from the great early American hymnal, The Sacred Harp.

Randall Thompson (1899-1984) wrote *Alleluia* in 1940 on a commission from Serge Kousevitsky, Music Director of the Boston Symphony Orchestra (BSO). It was performed by the entire student body for the opening exercises of the Berkshire Music Center, summer home of the BSO. An interesting historical note is that this anthem was sung to the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on the night before he was assassinated. A high school choir that was supposed to have sung for the meeting in Memphis that evening was delayed by bus trouble and missed the meeting. The students were upset, and when Dr. King found out they had arrived late, he asked them to please sing for him in his motel room. The students crowded into that small place and sang this inspiring work, the last music in this world that Dr. King would hear.

I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say, tune KINGSFOLD, first appeared in a 19th century collection of English folk melodies, but may date to the Middle Ages. The text was composed by Scottish clergy, Horatius Bonar (1808-1889), who came from a long line of ministers and composed many hymn texts and religious poems.

Go Now in Peace was composed in 1976 by Natalie Sleeth (1930-1992), who became one of the most performed and popular composers of church anthems especially for children's voices. One of her hymns, *In the Bulb There is a Flower*, was chosen for our *New Century Hymnal*. Born in Evanston, she received her musical training at Wellesley College, where her husband was a professor of homiletics.

Synergy was composed in 2023 by Kris Hansen (b. 1995). The music expresses a collective experience of support. A member of our St. Arbucks Quartet, he was raised, baptized, and confirmed at St. Pauls. He is an active singer, music producer, composer, trumpet player, and keyboard player in his own group, Semi-Cycle. He also performs regularly with other bands, including The Walters, Kweku Collins, and Othersides.
