



BUILDING UPDATE - ROOM NUMBERS AT ST. PAULS

St. Pauls is in the process of converting from room names to numbers. When construction is completed, formal signage will replace the temporary signage. Major locations, i.e., Sanctuary (115), Social Hall (015), Kitchen (010), Gym (009) will commonly use those titles, but their numbers are posted. Numbering begins at the Fullerton entrance (largely inaccessible during construction) and rises to the Kemper Place doorway: Main Level (100s), Upper Level (200s), Lower Level (000s). Reflecting on Use of Plastics

Although it seems difficult to link words written millennia ago, caring for creation is part of creating closeness with our Redeemer and understanding that ecological stewardship today will have consequences for hundreds of years.

For example, reflect on the ubiquitous presence of plastics, particularly single-use, which account for half the plastics in use. While single-use plastics are typically only used for 12-15 minutes, they can take hundreds of years to degrade: plastic cups 100 years, plastic cutlery and bags 400 years! [National Defense Council]

Before you plan social activities, eschew the plastics and embrace alternatives such as bamboo and paper.

TODAY'S MUSIC

This morning we celebrate the final offering of our **Special Music for 2024-2025**, **HEAR Ye + Bach**. We hope that each one of these works has lifted your spirits, touched your hearts, and opened expanded ways to appreciate music as part of worship.

Lieder ohne Worte (Songs Without Words) Op. 62, No. 1 and Op. 67, No. 1 were composed by Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) over a long period, 1829 to 1845. They were composed in eight books of six pieces each over that 16-year period. His sister Fanny (1805-1847) and later Edvard Grieg (1843-1907) also composed a set of songs without words. The hallmark of the pieces is a Romantic sense of lyricism.

I Sing the Mighty Power of God is a text by Issac Watts (1674-1848), the eminent English poet, who set the entire books of Psalms as poetry, which included Psalm 90, Our God Our Help in Ages Past. His poetry has inspired many composers. The tune, ELLACOMBE, is unattributed and of German origin, first published in a hymnal in 1784. In the 19th century, the tune was named for a village in Devonshire.

This version of *Symphony of Psalms* features work of two of the greatest composers of the 20th century, Igor Stravinsky (1882-1971) and Dimitri Shostakovitch (1906-1975). Along with Sergei Prokovieff (1891-1953), they are among the great lights of Russian music of that same time. Stravinsky composed *Symphony of Psalms* in 1930 on a commission from the Boston Symphony Orchestra and their Russian-born conductor Serge Koussevitsky. It was premiered in Boston in December 1930 and is for full orchestra and large chorus. This work was composed during Stravinsky's "second period" of compositional style, neoclassical. As a side note, our Chicago Symphony Orchestra and their second conductor, Fredrick Stock, commissioned Stravinsky to compose a work, his *Symphony in C*, in celebration of the CSO's 50th anniversary in 1941.

Returning to *Symphony of Psalms* in the 1930s, Dimitri Shostakovitch was a faculty member of the Leningrad Conservatory where Stravinsky had studied before the 1917 Revolution when it was known as the St. Petersburg Conservatory. That institution graduated such musical luminaries as Tchaikovsky, Rimsky-Korsakov, Prokofiev, and many others before and after the Revolution. Shostakovitch wanted to teach his composition students Stravinsky's *Symphony of Psalms*. Not having access to a large orchestra and chorus, and in order to introduce it to his students, he transcribed the orchestral score for piano four hands. The date of the transcription is listed as "sometime in the early 1930s." That is the version the Chancel Choir, Kevin Dzierzawski and Karina Kontorovitch will share with you in

worship today. Shostakovitch held Stravinsky in such esteem that he gave him a copy of his transcription when he met him in person in the Soviet Union in 1962.

The text for *God We Thank You For Our People* was written in 1986 by Ruth Duck (b. 1947). She is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, and has written four volumes of hymn texts. HOLY MANNA is an unattributed melody from the great American series of shaped-note hymnals from the early 19th century, including *The Sacred Harp*.

The text for *God Whose Giving Knows No Ending* was written in 1961 by Robert L. Edwards (1915-2006). He was a Congregational minister who focused on prison ministry, low income senior housing, and other ministries of social justice. The words are set to the famous Welsh tune, HYFRYDOL, by Rowan Hugh Prichard (1811-1887) when he was only 19. We also sing this tune to the text *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven* and *Love Divine All Loves Excelling*.

Valse Op. 11, No. 4 was composed in 1894 for "piano duet" by Sergei Rachmaninov (1873-1943). Rachmaninov was an incredibly gifted pianist in addition to being an unashamed Romantic composer in the 20th century when most composers were breaking away from melody and lush harmony. He was born in Russia but moved with his family to America in 1918 following the Russian Revolution. *Valse* is obviously French for waltz.
