



Acts 9 (selected verses)

Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." The men who were traveling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. ...lay hands on him so that he might regain his sight." But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem, and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel"... Ananias laid his hands on Saul and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength. Saul spent several days with the disciples in Damascus. At once, he began to preach in the synagogues that Jesus is the Son of God. All those who heard him were astonished and asked, "Isn't he the man who raised havoc in Jerusalem among those who call on this name? And hasn't he come here to take them as prisoners to the chief priests?"





Wicker Picnic Baskets

The rectangular, wicker picnic basket has new relevance when trying to avoid single-use plastic waste. Before plastic and styrofoam were readily available, these picnic baskets were packed with light-weight porcelain, specially sized utensils and cups and tablecloths and napkins.

Porcelain may be too heavy now, but it can be replaced by such materials as bamboo or heavy-weight paper. Utensils are still available in smaller sizes and durable glassware is now readily available. Finally, cloth napkins and tablecloths can be found in stores and thrift shops.





TODAY'S MUSIC

Our Prelude, *It Is Well With My Soul*, was composed in 1876 by Philip L. Bliss (1836-1878). A largely self-taught itinerant music teacher, he was converted at age 12 at a revival. It was Dwight L. Moody (1837-1899), famous evangelist and founder of the Moody Bible Institute here in Chicago who encouraged Bliss to become a singing evangelist. The text was written in 1873 by Horatio G. Spafford (1828-1888). He also gave the Bliss tune its name, VILLE DU HAVRE, which was the name of the ship carrying his wife and four daughters from Chicago to vacation in France. The ship sank in the Atlantic after a collision with another vessel and only his wife survived. He wrote this text *after* this loss. This arrangement was made by Colleen Henry (1946-2014), mother of Brendan Henry.

The text for *Awake, Awake to Love and Work* was composed in 1921 by Geoffrey Anketel Studdert Kenndey (1883-1929), who was an Anglican minister of proud Irish descent. He spent his life working in deprived surroundings. The tune, MORNING SONG, is from another great early American shape-note hymnal, *Kentucky Harmony*. The melody is based on the English folk song *Old King Cole*.

We Worship You, God uses the tune LYONS which was originally ascribed to Haydn, but more recent research indicates the composer was Joseph Martin Kraus (1756–1792), a German who resided in Sweden. The English text is by Robert Grant (1779–1838). He was of Scottish descent, but lived his entire life in India. He was deeply influenced by the poetic rendering of Psalms.

The text for *Child of Blessing, Child of Promise* was written in 1981 by a UCC pastor and teacher of theology, Ronald Cole-Turner (b. 1948). The tune, STUTTGART, was composed in 1715 by Christian Friederich Witt (1660-1716). Witt completed a huge hymnal, *Psalmodia Sacra*, the year before his death. Of the 774 hymns (!!!), he composed nearly 100. He was Kapellmeister of the Gotha court in Stuttgart at the same time that Bach was in Leipzig, just 300 miles north. An interesting side note is that Nathan Laube, world renowned organist and friend of St. Pauls, was until recently on the organ faculty at the Hochschule für Musick in Stuttgart. He has since returned to the faculty at the Eastman School of Music.

Come Unto Him is from Part One of arguably the most often performed and well known of the works of George Friderick Handel (1685-1759). This serene aria takes its text from Matthew 11:28 & 29 and directly precedes the chorus *His Yoke Is Easy*, which closes Part One of *Messiah*. Handel presented a number of performances of *Messiah*, making subtle and sometimes major changes for each performance

depending on how successful he felt a particular piece was, and sometimes based on who was available to sing. *Come Unto Him* was originally composed as a quasi duet with an alto singing *He Shall Feed His Flock* and the soprano following after with the text *Come Unto Him*. The term "quasi duet" is used to describe the fact that the two voices never sing together. Handel later composed a version for soprano alone.

Be Thou My Vision is a lovely Irish folk tune, SLANE. Mary E. Bryne (1880-1931), who was born in Ireland, made the translation from the original Gaelic in 1905. She was a respected university level academic in Dublin.

The text for *Amazing Grace* is by John Newton (1725-1807), who was a slave ship captain, but became an Anglican clergyman and fervent abolitionist. He once said that writing this text saved his soul. The tune, NEW BRITAIN, is most likely an African American spiritual and was first published in 1829.

The well-known Victorian text for *All Things Bright and Beautiful* was composed in 1848 by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895). She spent her entire life in Ireland and after marrying an Anglican priest, devoted herself to the service of the disadvantaged. She and her sister also founded a school for the deaf. John Rutter (b. 1945) wrote this anthem in 1983 on a commission by Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey.

God Speak to Me, That I May Speak is a text composed in 1872 by Frances Ridley Havergal (1836-1879). She was born in England and her father was an Anglican priest. Although she did not consider herself a poet, she wrote many hymn texts and also studied both Greek and Hebrew at the collegiate level. The tune CANONBURY was composed in 1839 and is attributed to the famous German Romantic composer Robert Schumann (1810-1856). It is an adaptation of his melody from Nachtstüke (night piece) No. 4 in G major. Johannes Brahms was a champion of the young Schumann's talent and had a close relationship with Robert and Clara Schumann, as well as with Robert until his death, and a lifelong connection with Clara after Robert's death.

Our postlude today, *Finale*, was composed by Daniel E. Gawthrop (b. 1949). Born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, he is known for his output of compositions for both choirs and the organ. He has received more than 100 commissions for his works. He attended both Michigan State University and Brigham Young University and currently resides in southern Idaho with his wife.
