

SCRIPTURE Mark Sancya

Galatians 5:1, 13-29

Christ has set us free to live a free life. So take your stand! Never again let anyone put a harness of slavery on you. Live freely, animated and motivated by God's Spirit. Then you won't feed the compulsions of selfishness. For there is a root of sinful self-interest in us that is at odds with a free spirit, just as the free spirit is incompatible with selfishness. These two ways of life are contrary to each other. You cannot live at times one way and at times another way according to how you feel on any given day.

It is obvious what kind of life develops out of trying to get your own way all the time: repetitive, loveless, cheap sex; a stinking accumulation of mental and emotional garbage; frenzied and joyless grabs for happiness; trinket gods; magic-show religion; paranoid loneliness; cutthroat competition; all-consuming-yet-never-satisfied wants; a brutal temper; an impotence to love or be loved; divided homes and divided lives; small-minded and lopsided pursuits; the vicious habit of depersonalizing everyone into a rival; uncontrolled and uncontrollable addictions; ugly parodies of community. I could go on. This isn't the first time I have warned you, you know. If you use your freedom this way, you will not inherit God's kingdom.

But what happens when we live God's way? He brings gifts into our lives, much the same way that fruit appears in an orchard. The fruits of the Spirit are these: affection for others, exuberance about life, serenity, patience, kindness, self control. We develop a willingness to stick with things, a sense of compassion in the heart, and a conviction that a basic holiness permeates things and people. We find ourselves involved in loyal commitments, not needing to force our way in life, able to marshal and direct our energies wisely.

Rules are helpless to bring this about; they only get in the way. Among those who belong to Christ, everything connected with getting our own way and mindlessly pursuing so called "necessities" is killed —crucified.

Since we have chosen the life of the Spirit, let us make sure that we do not just hold it as an idea in our heads or a sentiment in our hearts, but work out its implications in every detail of our lives. That means we will not compare ourselves with each other as if one of us were better and another worse. We have far more interesting things to do with our lives. Each of us is an original.

We trust God. God calls us to be the Church,

to celebrate God's presence,

to proclaim Jesus, crucified and risen, our judge and our hope.







Birdsong to Reduce Stress and Connect to Creation

"I know all the birds of the air, and all that moves in the field is mine." Psalm 50:11.

Chicago is on a migratory flyway and ringed by waterways and Frederick Law Olmsted's "green ribbons." This means birds and their songs are ubiquitous; yet, these songs are also often drowned out by city noise.

If you are feeling stressed and anxious, it turns out that listening to bird songs for five minutes will decrease your cortisol levels and heart rate and, equally important, bring you closer to God's magnificence. Recordings can be found on the internet, often accompanied by stunning visuals.

STEPHEN MINISTRY AT ST. PAULS

Our Stephen Ministers are here for you if you are going through a tough time. 



TODAY'S MUSIC

Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) composed the *Adagio* from *Sonata No. 1 in F minor, Op. 65, No. 1* for organ in 1844. Like Mozart, Mendelssohn had a very short and artistically productive life. He was born in Germany, but a huge source of his popularity existed outside his home country and he was especially beloved in England. Amongst his greatest accomplishments was the revival of the works of J. S. Bach, and the first "modern" performance of Bach's *St. Matthew Passion* after Bach's death. Although he is known primarily for orchestral works and oratorios, Mendelssohn composed six sonatas for organ.

Lift Every Voice and Sing includes the joyous refrain that our Chancel Choir sings as our Introit. The longer hymn is considered the unofficial anthem of black churches and the civil rights movement. J. Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954), the composer, and James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938), the poet, were brothers who crafted this wonderful hymn together. They also wrote Broadway musicals and edited song collections as a team. This text reflects both the struggles for civil rights and optimism about the future.

The text for *Bring Many Names* was written by Brian A. Wren (b. 1936), a major British contributor to contemporary hymn writing. He was a pastor of a Congregational Church in Essex. WESTCHASE was composed in 1989 by Carlton R. Young (b. 1926). He served in World War II and became a teacher, editor, composer and conductor. He edited two editions of the *United Methodist Hymnal*.

The text of *I Come With Joy* was also written by Brian Wren. He wrote the hymn as a summary of a series of sermons on the meaning of communion. The tune is an old American hymn, DOVE OF PEACE, from the *Southern Harmony Hymnal*, part of the Sacred Harp tradition. It was arranged by Austin Lovelace (1919-2010), who was organist and choirmaster for several years at First United Methodist Church in Evanston.

All Are Welcome is a recently composed hymn and one of our favorites from a past hymne fest. The tune is TWO OAKS. Dating from 1994, the words and music were both created by Marty Haugen (b. 1950), an American composer of numerous hymns and liturgical music. This hymn was shared with Kurt R. Hansen by a college friend, Alisa Kasmir, and it has quickly become an anthem of St. Pauls' Open and Affirming ministry.

Let their celestial concerts all unite is from the oratorio Samson, which was composed in 1741, the same year George Friderick Handel (1685-1759) penned Messiah. However, it was first performed in London in 1743, a year following Messiah's debut in Dublin. The libretto is by Newburgh Hamilton (1691-1761) based on John Milton's Samson Agonistes. Samson is, of course, the story of the rise and fall of the Hebrew Bible hero Samson.

The music for *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* (ODE TO JOY) was composed by Beethoven (1770-1827) and is the chorale melody from the final movement of his Ninth Symphony (1824). The original German text (1785) was by the famous poet and dramatist Friedrich Schiller (1759-1805), and the English text was composed in 1907 by Henry Van Dyke (1852-1933). Van Dyke, an American author and clergyman, was appointed ambassador to the Netherlands by President Woodrow Wilson prior to the outbreak of World War I.

Our Postlude - Craig Curry, who arranged ODE TO JOY, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.

A Gaelic Blessing was composed in 1978 by John Rutter (b.1945). The text is from an old Gaelic rune. It is another work commissioned by Mel Olson, the church choir director with whom Kurt R. Hansen grew up in Omaha at Dundee Presbyterian Church. Mel was also largely responsible for introducing John Rutter and his music to this country. In June 2024, John Rutter was knighted by King Charles, an honor richly deserved.
