

SCRIPTURE

Matthew 3: 1-11

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord;

make his paths straight.' "

Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region around the Jordan were going out to him, and they were baptized by him in the River Jordan, confessing their sins.

"I baptize you with water for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is more powerful than I, and I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Lord, Don't Move the Mountain lyrics and music were written by Doris Mae Akers (1923-1995), a famous African American gospel composer, arranger and singer. This is another gospel song that Mahalia Jackson sang and this arrangement is by Brendan Henry.

The Introit, *Lift Every Voice and Sing*, is the joyous refrain of a longer hymn that is the unofficial anthem of black churches and the civil rights movement. J. Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954), the composer, and James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938), the poet, were brothers who crafted this wonderful hymn together. They also wrote Broadway musicals and edited song collections as a team.

Holy, Holy, Holy - It is interesting to note that the text for this hymn draws from both Jewish and Catholic liturgy. The Jewish prayer for every Shabbat service is *Kadosh, kadosh, kadosh* and the Catholic prayer is *Sanctus, sanctus, sanctus*. Reginald Heber (1783-1826) penned this text in 1826 just before his death. Winning poetry contests at Oxford in his student days, he became a member of the clergy and took over his father's parish. The tune, NICAEA, was named after the Council of Nicaea (325 CE) when the Church formulated the concept of the Trinity. It was composed by John Dykes (1823-1876), who created many famous English hymn tunes.

The text for *Blessed Be the Tie That Binds* was penned in 1782 by John Fawcett (1740-1817). He was born in England, orphaned at age 12, and by age 16 became a self-taught preacher. He led a very prominent church in London for seven years. This text states the mutual feelings that Fawcett and his congregation had for each other at his parting for another pulpit. The tune DENNIS was composed by Hans Georg Nägeli (1773-1836). He was born in Switzerland and became an influential music educator in both Germany and France. His early instruction was from his father and concentrated on the music of Bach.

The River was composed and released in 2021 by All Nations Music by Todd Dulaney (b. 1983). He is an Illinois native, gospel singer and former baseball player. He was drafted by the New York Mets in 2002 and although he never made it to the majors, he played for three seasons in the minor leagues. His musical career started in 2011 with the release of the CD *Pulling Me Through*. He has released four other gospel albums.

Total Praise was "composed," both the words and music, in 1996 by Richard Smallwood (b. 1948). The word "composed" must be amplified to be understood in the context of Gospel music. Very often printed scores of gospel songs follow AFTER a song is learned and performed – a bit like transcribing a jazz solo that is improvised in the moment. Most gospel choirs learn their music aurally, or by ear. That gives the spirit and voice more freedom within strict time. Richard Smallwood is a classically trained pianist and singer who graduated *cum laude* from Howard University, and he was also steeped in the style and substance of the gospel musical traditions. He was BOTH classically trained and also adept at creating music and text in a "spiritual jazz" freedom and inspiration. *Total Praise* is one of his most popular gospel songs and came out of a time of great sorrow in his life. *Precious Lord* was "composed" by Thomas Dorsey under the same kind of sorrow. Carol Cymbala is the Music Director of the Brooklyn Tabernacle Choir and has won six Grammy Awards with the choir. The Tabernacle and its Choir celebrate a diverse membership and styles of worship.

Every Time I Feel the Spirit is an upbeat spiritual from the rich tradition of music created by African Americans. As with nearly all spirituals, its source is unknown and was taught and shared aurally. The text couldn't be more perfect for Pentecost Sunday.

To Our God was composed and later released in 2010 on the album *And If God Is For Us...*. The album features Chris Tomlin (b. 1972), but this song was created by Judith McCalister (b. 1963). A native of Harlem in New York City, she is a pentecostal gospel musician and leader of Never Ending Worship. Her early education was listening to her mother play piano in her father's church. She attended Oral Roberts University.
