Luke 13: 10-17

He was teaching in one of the meeting places on the Sabbath. There was a woman present, so twisted and bent over with arthritis that she couldn't even look up. She had been afflicted with this for eighteen years. When Jesus saw her, he called her over. "Woman, you're free!" He laid hands on her and suddenly she was standing straight and tall, giving glory to God.

The meeting-place president, furious because Jesus had healed on the Sabbath, said to the congregation, "Six days have been defined as work days. Come on one of the six if you want to be healed, but not on the seventh, the Sabbath."

But Jesus shot back, "You frauds! Each Sabbath every one of you regularly unties your cow or donkey from its stall, leads it out for water, and thinks nothing of it. So why isn't it all right for me to untie this daughter of Abraham and lead her from the stall where Satan has had her tied these eighteen years?"

These words reduced his opponents to shame, but the crowd was thrilled at all the glorious things he did.



The Modern Summer Kitchen: Those who grew up in the country remember the "summer kitchen"— a formal or improvised space, often outside on a porch with cross-breeze, or even deep in a cellar.

Here are some tips that will help keep the kitchen temperature down:

- -Use small appliances;
- -Use right-sized burners and pots;
- -Grill in volume and freeze or refrigerate;
- -Use fans to create a cross breeze rather than increasing the air conditioning;
- -Avoid boiling larger pots of water, such as for corn and pasta, using alternative techniques to cook;

Above all, lighten and simplify the menu!

TODAY'S MUSIC

A Mighty Fortress Is Our God is arguably the greatest Martin Luther (1483-1546) hymn and encapsulated the theology of the Lutheran Church. It is so good that it is worth singing more than once this month.;-) The tune name, EIN FESTE BURG, are the first three words of the original German text. Luther's original version is almost dance-like in rhythm. The recessional hymn presents a more majestic march.

I Expect to See Him is by Jessy Dixon (1938 - 2011), another gospel artist and composer with deep roots in Chicago. His music was beloved outside his own community and he received seven Grammy nominations in his career. He toured the world with Paul Simon after Mr. Simon heard him and the Jessy Dixon Singers at a concert at New York City's Radio City Music Hall. He also wrote music for artists as varied as Diana Ross and Cher.

Lord, I Want to Be a Christian is another in a long line of great African American spirituals. Neither the tune nor text are attributed. The origin may go as far back as 1750. The first publication to include it was *Folk Songs of the American Negro* (1907), compiled by brothers Frederick (dates unknown) and John (1871-1925) Work. John Work was also music director of the famous Fisk Jubilee Singers.

Come O Fount of Every Blessing, to the tune NETTLETON, is from the rich American tradition of the Sacred Harp hymnals, specifically *Wyeth's Repository of Sacred Music*. The text was written by Robert Robinson (1735-1790), who began his professional life as an apprentice to a hairdresser before committing himself to a religious life.

Wanting Memories was composed in 1990 by Ysaÿe M. Barnwell (b. 1946). She also composed the poetry. Born and raised in Harlem, she was a member of the famous a cappella group Sweet Honey and the Rock for 34 years and composed many of the group's songs and arrangements. In addition to her work in music, she has a Ph.D. in speech pathology from the University of Pittsburgh. Her father was a professional violinist and taught his daughter starting at age 2. She is a passionate proponent of building community through singing.

By Night was composed in 2022 by Elaine Hagenberg (b. 1979). A 2002 Drake University graduate, she has received multiple commissions from universities, churches and community choirs and has gained a growing international reputation. The text is by Harriett Prescott Spofford (1835-1921). She was an American novelist, poet, and writer of detective stories. Speaking of this composition, Ms. Hagenberg says, "Because nature fills me with joy and peace equally, the contrasting

middle section invites listeners into a moment of meditation through the 'beauty born in its Maker's thought.'"

This Little Light of Mine has been a St. Pauls favorite for more than 40 years. It has an uplifting and spiritually powerful message that celebrates the sharing of faith. This is another example from the deep well of spirituals from the African American tradition. The arrangement that we are used to singing was created by Dr. Sammie "Sam" Hill, who was the Director of Music and Organist at St. Pauls from 1971-1991. Sam, and our current Director of Music, Kurt R. Hansen, both studied with the same teacher at Northwestern University, Grigg Fountain.

The *Fugue in C Major* BuxWV 174, was composed by Dietrich Buxtehude (1637?-1707). Buxtehude's music and his skill as an organist and composer had a profound effect on Bach. A true story is that Bach, at age 20, walked (!) nearly 250 miles from Arnstadt to Lübeck just to hear and work with Buxtehude. That would be like walking from St. Pauls to Toledo, Ohio.
