





High Impact Behaviors to Reduce Emissions.

The most significant actions individuals can take to reduce carbon emissions are avoiding flying, switching to renewable energy sources, shifting to a vegetarian diet, and relatedly, having a pet that is not a carnivore.

For example, a round trip flight on a 737 from NY to LA, produced more than 1,300 pounds of emissions per passenger, the equivalent emissions to a human eating meat for a year or having a car for three months. Therefore, next time you consider flying, measure out the costs and weigh the alternatives, and if you must fly, consider buying carbon offsets. [Statistics from the UN International CivilAviation Organization].

TODAY'S MUSIC

My Lord, What a Morning is another in a long line of stirring African American spirituals. Since there is no attributed composer nor author, we can hypothesize that the words and melody were passed orally from person to person and group to group. It is also likely that this is another profound example of how enslaved blacks imagined a world and time that they would be free by singing in code that their enslavers would misunderstand as only referring to the second coming of Christ.

To You O God All Creatures Sing is a text that was adapted by Sister Miriam Therese Winter (b. 1938). She is a Catholic theologian and a Medical Mission Sister who has worked in a number war-torn areas, including Ethiopia and Cambodia. The German hymn tune, LASST UNS ERFREUEN, dates from 1623 and was first found in a hymnal published in Cologne, Germany. We recognize it as the same tune as our *Festival Doxology*.

We Would Be Building employs the tune FINLANDIA because the melody was composed by Jean Sibelius (1865–1957) as part of his famous tone poem by the same name that honored his homeland. The text is by Purd E. Deitz (1897–1968). Born in Pennsylvania, he became a clergyman in the Reformed Church, which was the original denomination of St. Pauls until 1955 when that was one of the denominations that merged with the Congregational Church to become the United Church of Christ.

Quis et homo is a duet from the oratorio *Stabat Mater* composed beginning in 1831 and completed in 1841 by Gioachino Rossini (1792-1868). Rossini was one of the most active and beloved opera composers in the early Romantic period. In Italy, the style of operas composed by him and two others, Vincenzo Bellini (1801-1835) and Gaetano Donizetti (1797-1848), were called *Bel canto*, beautiful singing. This style influenced all of Rossini's vocal works including his *Stabat Mater*. *Stabat Mater*, i.e., sorrowful mother, was a 13th century hymn to the Virgin Mary depicting her sorrow at the crucifixion. This text was set numerous times by other famous composers, including Josquin des Prez, Pergolesi, Dvorak, Schubert, Liszt, Verdi, Pårt and Poulenc, to name a few.

The text for *My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less* was written in 1834 by Edward Mote (1797-1874). British born Mote wrote a number of hymn texts following a spiritual awakening resulting from the preaching of an evangelical preacher. He also authored a number of Christian pamphlets. SOLID ROCK was composed in 1863 by the prolific hymn writer, William Bradbury (1816-1868). He was raised on his

father's farm in Maine, developed a love of music as a child and began playing the organ in church by age 15. Among the best known of his hymns is the children's hymn, *Jesus Loves Me, This I Know.*

Craig Curry, who arranged this great hymn tune, *For the Beauty of the Earth*, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed. In 1838, Contrad Kocher (1786-1872) composed the original tune, DIX. He composed 25 German hymns, among them *Praise to the Lord the Almighty*.

St. Pauls UCC has a vibrant history in the city of Chicago. Founded in 1843, we are one of the city's oldest churches. In 1989, we became one of America's first congregations to declare ourselves "Open and Affirming" of LGBTQ+ people.

From founding Chicago's largest provider of social services to at-risk children to starting a home for the elderly, from housing protestors at the 1968 Democratic Convention to hosting Lincoln Park's first MLK day march against violence on Chicago's streets, we are proud to make a joyful sound in the city.

Most important, during the past 182 years we are glad to have introduced thousands of children and adults to the amazing, inclusive, life changing, uplifting love of God. We do so in worship that is traditional, but far from conventional.
