





ANNOUNCEMENTS

ENTERING ST. PAULS BETWEEN 9/15 and 10/8 is OK!

Good news! Our "Expand and Elevate" project is unfolding beautifully. Exterior construction will soon expand to the south end of the courtyard. As a result, our two primary doors will be inaccessible for three weeks. The temporary accessibility entrance on Fullerton for those using walkers and wheelchairs will remain unchanged.

Now through October 8, both the office entrance and the main Sanctuary entrance on Orchard are closed. During this time, we will enter St. Pauls through the Kemper Sanctuary door and through the alley door. The Kemper Sanctuary door is at the corner of Orchard and Kemper. If you get confused, remember that entering the church on Sunday is "OK!" On weekdays and evenings, the alley entrance will be used. This door is equipped with a doorbell, intercom, and camera. After you ring the doorbell, the door will automatically unlock. In the evenings, staff will be nearby to assist when meetings are scheduled. On Sunday mornings, the alley entrance will remain a good way to enter the building. Additionally, the Kemper Sanctuary entrance will be available.

The alley entrance is behind the building. The alley runs east and west parallel to Fullerton, and then doglegs left when it reaches the east end of our building, running north and south along the back of Saint Pauls. We can enter the alley via the back of the church parking lot on Kemper or at the alley opening between St. Pauls and the home at 644 W. Kemper.

SEPTEMBER'S BLAST FROM THE PAST

St. Pauls was founded in 1843 by German immigrants and our rich history continues to this day. Our archives, housed in four rooms and a vault, include photos, documents, artifacts, tapes, videos, books, and all bound bulletins and newsletters, along with marriage, baptism, death, and membership records—many in original German script dating back to 1846. These items are stored in file drawers, archival boxes, cabinets, shelves, and a cabinet of more than 40 storyboards. A bronze plaque on the Clark Street bridge over the Chicago River commemorates the sinking of "The Christmas Tree" ship. We'll be sharing more stories in upcoming bulletins.

In the public policy battles for climate change initiatives, climate policies are either "push" or "pull". Push are measures such as taxes and bans that discourage carbon-intensive behaviors. On the other hand, pull measures are represented by subsidies and support for lower carbon initiatives, such as solar energy.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Truth is the opening song on the 2017 EP *Harmony of Difference* by Kamasi Washington (b.1981). Mr Washington is a jazz saxophonist born and raised in Los Angeles. He studied in the Department of Ethnomusicology at UCLA. As a student, he was invited to play with a faculty quartet. In addition to his solo career, he has collaborated with musicians in jazz, hip-hop and pop music.

This Is the Day uses a folk melody and unattributed words from Fiji. First published in 1967 in an Australian hymnal, it lends itself to be sung in a call-and-response style.

Praise to the Lord, the Almighty is another great hymn from our German heritage. The tune, LOBE DEN HERRN, is the first line of the first stanza of the German text. The composer of the music is unknown, though it was first published in a hymnal in 1668. The original text was written by Joachim Neander (1650-1680). Although he was reported to have spent a "riotous youth," he became the first important hymn writer of the German Reform Church.

God Reigns O'er All the Earth is sung to the tune: TERRA BEATA. The source of the music is an English folk melody which first appeared as a hymn in 1906. The text, written in 1981, is by Jane Parker Huber (1926-2008), one of the most prolific contemporary authors of hymn texts. She was born to missionary parents in China and was a lifelong Presbyterian who focused her hymn texts and ministry on peace-making, justice and inclusiveness.

The text for *This Is My Song* was composed in 1934 by Lloyd Stone as a prayer for peace between the two World Wars. The beautiful tune is from the well-known tone poem *Finlandia* by Jean Sibelius (1865-1957).

Sh'ma koleynu was composed by Max Janowski (1912-1991). He was born in Berlin and after fleeing after *Kristallnacht*, eventually became Cantor and Director of Music at KAM-Isaiah Israel Congregation in Chicago for 50 years. Kurt and Terry Hansen sang with him for his last 17 years. Mr. Janowski was truly one of the "great lights" of Jewish music of the 20th century. *Sh'ma koleynu* is a devoted and impassioned prayer for mercy from the *S'lichot* service. *S'lichot* is a service at "midnight" on the Sabbath preceding *Rosh Hashanah*.

Crown Him With Many Crowns is a text composed in 1851 by Matthew Bridges (1800-1894). He was born in England, lived in Quebec, and wrote many hymn texts in both English and German. This hymn also has an "alterer", Godfrey Thring (1823-1903), who altered Bridges original text slightly in 1871 to the familiar text we know. The tune, DIADEMATA, was composed in 1868 by George P. Elvey (1816-1893) specifically for this text. He became the organist for St. George's Chapel at Windsor Castle.

The *Festive Trumpet Tune* was composed by David German (b. 1954) for his own wedding ceremony. He was Organist/Choir Master at Calvary Church in Charlotte, North Carolina, from 1983 until the mid-1990s. It is by far his most performed work.
