

ANNOUNCEMENTS

ENTERING ST. PAULS BETWEEN 9/15 and 10/22 is OK!

Good news! Our "Expand and Elevate" project is unfolding beautifully. Exterior construction will soon expand to the south end of the courtyard. As a result, our two primary doors will be inaccessible for four weeks. The temporary accessibility entrance on Fullerton for those using walkers and wheelchairs will remain unchanged.

Now through October 22, both the office entrance and the main Sanctuary entrance on Orchard are closed. During this time, we will enter St. Pauls through the Kemper Sanctuary door and through the alley door. The Kemper Sanctuary door is at the corner of Orchard and Kemper. If you get confused, remember that entering the church on Sunday is "OK!" On weekdays and evenings, the alley entrance will be used. This door is equipped with a doorbell, intercom, and camera. After you ring the doorbell, the door will automatically unlock. In the evenings, staff will be nearby to assist when meetings are scheduled. On Sunday mornings, the alley entrance will remain a good way to enter the building. Additionally, the Kemper Sanctuary entrance will be available.

The alley entrance is behind the building. The alley runs east and west parallel to Fullerton, and then doglegs left when it reaches the east end of our building, running north and south along the back of St. Pauls. We can enter the alley via the back of the church parking lot on Kemper or at the alley opening between St. Pauls and the home at 644 W. Kemper.

Besides the celebration of Reformation Sunday, October is also the time we acknowledge the anniversary of St. Pauls' founding – a double birthday, if you will. St. Pauls traces its beginnings to the arrival of German immigrants to Chicago in the early 1840s. "A man died and a church was born" was the concise way our history was written back then. There was no minister to conduct services in the German language, so an original group of nine men (it was always men in those days) in Spring 1843 organized our church during a meeting in a store on Franklin & Lake Streets. More to come from our history over the next months.

Caring for Creation and Remembering St. Francis

St. Francis was a 11th century aristocrat who founded the Franciscan order, which emphasizes humility, poverty and a closeness to nature. October 4th was his feast day.

In 2023, the City of Chicago's animal shelter euthanized 2,455 animals. Most days the shelter is full; by April 2025, shelter inhabitants had increased by 20% over 2024.

There are concrete solutions to this heartbreak: 1) increase access to spay and neuter programs; 2) sanction backyard breeding; 3) support low-income animal owners; 4) expand the adoption and fostering pipeline; 5) increase funding and volunteer support.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Because He Lives! was jointly composed and text written by William (b. 1936) (music) and his wife Gloria (b. 1942) Gaither. They have been married since 1962 and partners in creating Christian music. Both are singers and often perform together. They have performed their gospel music on TV and revival meetings for many years.

The text, *O Day of Radiant Gladness*, was composed in 1862 by Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885). He was the nephew of the famous poet William Wordsworth and had a long career as a priest in the Anglican Church. The tune, ES FLOG EIN KLEINS WALDVÖGELEIN is a 17th century German folk melody first published in a manuscript found in Memmingen.

I Sing the Mighty Power of God is a text by Issac Watts (1674-1848), the eminent English poet, who set the entire books of Psalms as poetry, including Psalm 90, Our God Our Help in Ages Past. His poetry has inspired many composers. The tune, ELLACOMBE, is unattributed but of German origin, first published in a hymnal in 1784. In the 19th century, the tune was named for a village in Devonshire.

Great Is Thy Faithfulness, tune FAITHFULNESS, dates from 1923 and was composed by William M. Runyan (1870-1957). He finished his ministry in Kansas and was particularly fond of the poet Thomas Chisholm (1866-1960), who wrote this text. Runyan set 25 of Chisholm's poems to music. Chisholm based this text on Lamentation 3:22 & 23: *Because of the Lord's great love, we are not consumed.*

There Is a Balm in Gilead is a Black Spiritual. In the Hebrew Bible, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River. This region was known for having skillful physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree particular to that area. Many believed this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief of their oppression. For slaves in our country, crossing the Jordan River was code for escaping their bondage by escaping to the north over such rivers as the Potomac and Ohio.

Now Thank We All Our God is a translation by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878) of the original German by Martin Rinkart (1586-1649) written 1636. Winkworth, although born in England, spent many years in Dresden, which is why she was so adept at translating German chorales. She was also a tireless fighter for women's

rights. Rinkart became a scholar at St. Thomas School in Leipzig where Bach would later be Kapellmeister. The tune, NUN DANKET, takes its name from the first words of the German text. It is most often attributed to Johann Crüger (1558-1662), who in reality was the publisher of the psalter where this hymn tune first appeared.

The Road Home was composed in 2001 by Stephen Paulus (1949-2014). He received a commission from the Dale Warland Singers to write a short folksong type arrangement. Paulus fell in love with the tune, PROSPECT, from one of the great American shape-note hymnals of the early 19th century, The Southern Harmony Songbook. Paulus composed more than 600 works for choirs, opera, and chamber music and received numerous Grammy nominations and awards. Michael Dennis Browne (b. 1940), a long-time friend and collaborator of Paulus, created three stanzas to fit the melody. Browne was born in England of Irish ancestry and moved to Minnesota in 1965. He is now Professor Emeritus at the University of Minnesota. This anthem was donated to the Chancel Choir by Nancy Pifer in memory of her mom, Dolores Pifer. Dolores was a beloved member of St. Pauls and our tenor section. It is also offered in memory of Oscar, who passed away last week after 18 years and was with Dolores from age 80 through the end of her life. Oscar will be missed by Nancy, Mark, Nadia, and Oliver.

How Firm a Foundation, although of anonymous origin, is a true American hymn first published in Funk's Genuine Church Music in 1832. That hymnal is part of what is often referred to as the Sacred Harp, or shape-note hymnal, tradition in our country, which began in the early 19th century. These treasures gained a rebirth during the bicentennial celebrations in 1976. Did you know that before the revival of this tune, FOUNDATION, this text was most often sung to the tune Adeste Fideles (O Come All Ye Faithful)? The text is also unattributed, but first discovered by John Rippon (1751–1836), who was an English Baptist clergy. He noted the author as "K."

The *Andante espressivo* was composed in 1963 by William Walton (1902-1983). He was one of the most prominent British composers of the 20th century. Among his most recognised works are the oratorio *Belshazzar's Feast* and the stirring march *Crown Imperial*. In 1942, he composed the *Spitfire Prelude and Fugue* dedicated to the RAF and the Spitfire fighter plane they flew. He also composed many film scores.
