





### ENTERING ST. PAULS BETWEEN 9/15 and 10/22 is OK!

Good news! Our "Expand and Elevate" project is unfolding beautifully. Exterior construction will soon expand to the south end of the courtyard. As a result, our two primary doors will be inaccessible for four weeks. The temporary accessibility entrance on Fullerton for those using walkers and wheelchairs will remain unchanged.

Now through October 22, both the office entrance and the main Sanctuary entrance on Orchard are closed. During this time, we will enter St. Pauls through the Kemper Sanctuary door and through the alley door. The Kemper Sanctuary door is at the corner of Orchard and Kemper. If you get confused, remember that entering the church on Sunday is "OK!" On weekdays and evenings, the alley entrance will be used. This door is equipped with a doorbell, intercom, and camera. After you ring the doorbell, the door will automatically unlock. In the evenings, staff will be nearby to assist when meetings are scheduled. On Sunday mornings, the alley entrance will remain a good way to enter the building. Additionally, the Kemper Sanctuary entrance will be available.

The alley entrance is behind the building. The alley runs east and west parallel to Fullerton, and then doglegs left when it reaches the east end of our building, running north and south along the back of Saint Pauls. We can enter the alley via the back of the church parking lot on Kemper or at the alley opening between St. Pauls and the home at 644 W. Kemper.

#### **BLAST FROM THE PAST**

Besides the celebration of Reformation Sunday, October is also the time when we acknowledge the anniversary of St. Pauls' founding – a double birthday, if you will. St. Pauls can trace its beginnings to the arrival of German immigrants to Chicago in the early 1840s. "A man died and a church was born" was the concise way our history was written back then. There was no minister to conduct services in the German language, so an original group of nine men (it was always men in those days) in Spring 1843 organized our church during a meeting in a store on Franklin & Lake Streets. More to come from our history over the next months.

"Greenwashing" is the term environmentalists use when referring to the idea that the production, use and recycling of plastics can be made environmentally sustainable. The reality is quite the opposite. In Lake Michigan alone, 11.6 million pounds of plastic is introduced per year. Plastic does not disappear; rather, it breaks down into micro particles and ultimately contaminates drinking water and wildlife habitats. The health consequences for humans and wildlife are real, extensive and some yet unknown, and include: endocrine disruption, reproductive problems, and increased risk of cancers and heart disease.

#### **TODAY'S MUSIC**

Bradley Sowash (b. 1960), who arranged this great hymn tune, *For the Beauty of the Earth*, is a jazz pianist, composer and educator specializing in improvisation. He is a music composition graduate of The Ohio State University, has authored *That's Jazz*, as well as a nine-volume jazz piano method, *Creative Chords*. In 1838, Contrad Kocher (1786-1872) composed the original tune, DIX. He composed 25 German hymns, among them *Praise to the Lord the Almighty*.

Claire Shore composed both the music and words in 2010 to this "Introit for St. Francis Day," *God Bless the Animals*. It was composed for a children's choir for a service blessing animals on St. Francis Day in 2010 at Calvary United Methodist Church in Lake Worth, Florida. Ms. Shore was only the second woman to earn a Doctorate of Musical Arts in composition from Juilliard School of Music. Her works are widely performed and she has held numerous university faculty positions.

The text for *For the Beauty of the Earth* was written by Folliott S. Pierpoint (1835-1917). In the spring of 1863, Pierpont sat on a hill above his home of Bath, England, as this text flowed from his gratitude for the wonders of nature. The tune DIX was composed by German composer Conrad Kocher (1786-1872). He was trained as a teacher and eventually founded the School for Sacred Song in Stuttgart.

The author of the text for *O How Glorious Full of Wonder* is Curtiss Beach (1914-1993). He was Harvard educated and came from a long line of ministers. He wrote this text in 1958 while serving a church in Pasadena, California. The tune, IN BABILONE, is a traditional Dutch melody first published in 1710. It was adapted as a hymn by Julius Röntgen (1855-1932), a Dutch Romantic composer and pianist. Brahms chose him to debut his *First Piano Concerto*.

The text for *We Cannot Own the Sunlit Sky* was penned in 1984 by Ruth Duck (1947-2024). She was a prolific hymn text and music composer. In addition, she was an ordained minister in the United Methodist Church and also was on the faculty of the Garrett Evangelical Seminary in Evanston. The tune, ENDLESS SONG, was composed by Robert Lowry (1826-1899). Lowrey was a preacher and scholar with a musical background from his childhood.

*O How Amiable* was composed in 1934 by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1871-1958). It is a wonderful example of an English form of church music called a "verse anthem." The first well-known composer of this form was Gustav Holst (1874-1934), a contemporary of Vaughan Williams. In general, the verse anthem is a simpler church anthem based on a familiar hymn tune with additional musical variations.

The text of *I Come with Joy* was written by Brian Wren (b. 1936), who is a pastor in the Congregational Church in England. He wrote the hymn as a summary of a series of sermons on the meaning of communion. The tune is an old American hymn, DOVE OF PEACE, from the *Southern Harmony Hymnal*, part of the Sacred Harp tradition. It was arranged by Austin Lovelace (1919-2010), who was Organist and Choirmaster for several years at First United Methodist Church in Evanston.

The *Prelude and Fugue in E Flat Major* BWV 552 is the closing piece to Johann Sebastian Bach's (1685-1750) incredible collection, *Clavier-Übung III*. It is a monumental work of music for liturgical services. The Fugue is often called "St. Anne," because the first subject of the fugue sounds exactly like the tune for *O God, Our Help in Ages Past*. Bach had no knowledge of that tune and it is an interesting coincidence that it sounds like our beloved English hymn. The fugue can also be considered a "Trinity fugue," because it is in three parts, Creator, Christ and Holy Spirit.
