1 Corinthians 15, selections

Jesus died for our sins, exactly as Scripture tells it; he was buried; he was raised from death on the third day, he presented himself alive to Peter, then to his closest followers, and later to more than five hundred of his followers all at the same time, and finally presented himself alive to me.

Now, let me ask you something profound yet troubling. If you became believers because you trusted the proclamation that Christ is alive, risen from the dead, how can you let people say that there is no such thing as a resurrection? If there's no resurrection, there's no living Christ. And why do you think I keep risking my neck in this dangerous work? I look death in the face practically every day I live. Do you think I'd do this if I wasn't convinced of your resurrection and mine as guaranteed by the resurrected Messiah Jesus? But let me tell you something wonderful, a mystery I'll probably never fully understand. We're not all going to die—but we are all going to be changed. You hear a blast to end all blasts from a trumpet, and in the time that you look up and blink your eyes—it's over. On signal from that trumpet from heaven, the dead will be up and out of their graves, beyond the reach of death, never to die again. At the same moment and in the same way, we'll all be changed. In the resurrection scheme of things, this has to happen: everything perishable taken off the shelves and replaced by the imperishable, this mortal replaced by the immortal. Then the words of the prophet will come true:

"Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?"



INFORMATION FOR FAMILIES

Members of St. Pauls who died this church year, and friends at whose services a St. Pauls pastor officiated

> Linda Shields-Farrington January 28, 2024

Linda was born and raised in the Jefferson Park neighborhood of Chicago. In her twenties, she moved to Atlanta and remained there working as a health care executive before retirement. She was baptized at Saint Pauls as an infant. Over the entire course of her life, she carried fond memories of her childhood experience of Saint Pauls and asked her caretaker and best friend to arrange for a Saint Pauls burial.

Kathleen D. Reinhardt-Mullins November 1, 2024

Kathleen was baptized at Saint Pauls in 1951 and was confirmed here in 1964. She was a member of one of the old Saint Pauls German families.

Marcia Knudson March 11, 2025

A humorous truth-teller, Marcia was a longtime lay leader at Saint Pauls. She moved to Chicago with her father and stepmother in the 1960s and married her husband Wes Salsbury in 1989. She was a clinical social worker working with children, families and teenagers. Marcia taught Confirmation classes at Saint Pauls for nearly ten years. Marcia served as the Secretary of the Church Council, formed two needlework groups, and founded our retirement group. For 32 years, Marcia faithfully prepared bread for our communion services.

Anthony Rodriguez April 11, 2025

Anthony was born in Chicago, grew up in Puerto Rico and moved back here when he was seven. He spent most of the rest of his life in Logan Square. A graduate of the University of Michigan, he worked as an educator at St. Anne in Pilsen and his alma mater, St. Ignatius College Prep. He then became a principal at El Cuarto Año High School, moving on to administration at Youth Connection Charter School. He was married to his husband Steve Ochs for more than thirty years. He loved the beach, the Cubs, and Michigan football.

Mike Stensaas May 2, 2025

Mike grew up in South Dakota and served as an officer in the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers in Germany. A graduate of Harvard Business School, he worked in consulting and professional coaching. Mike joined Saint Pauls in 1996. He was one of our Stephen Ministers for several years, bringing his good listening skills and compassionate heart to Saint Pauls members going through difficult times.

Carole Crowley May 30, 2025

A longtime member of Saint Pauls, Carole was a talented painter who exhibited her work in Michigan and Chicago. For ten years, she was the Executive Director of the Park West After School program, based here at Saint Pauls.

Toby Rogers May 31, 2025

A longtime lay leader at Saint Pauls with a keen eye for numbers and a warm, friendly and honest presence, Toby was raised in Michigan. He was an active member of the Faith and Public Issues Group, served as Saint Pauls Treasurer, and was a faithful member of our Finance Committee for many years. Toby and his ex-wife Jennifer raised their three children Cameron, Mackenzie and Harrison here at Saint Pauls. Toby worked in healthcare and was an early leader in the development of telehealth platforms.

Annette Robinson June 25, 2025

Born in Northeast Alabama south of Chattanooga, she was at the head of her school and attended the University of Alabama on scholarship during turbulent times. After law school, Annette came to Chicago where she worked for a bank trust company, married Layton Olson, and began spending summers at a cottage on the Michigan Dunes. Joining Saint Pauls in the early 1980s, she especially enjoyed music, religion and the arts performances, book discussions, and conversations with members on humans, society building and joyful work.

Evert Martin July 11, 2025

Evert joined St. Pauls in 1999 and served in our congregation in many ways before returning to Michigan. He was active in our outreach ministries, especially with the Night Ministry, and was a Sunday School teacher. Prior to moving to Chicago and joining Saint Pauls, Evert served for more than 30 years as an elementary school teacher in the St. Joseph, Michigan public school system, where he was beloved by both his students and his fellow teachers.

Mead Gifford August 4, 2025

Mead was a lifelong resident of Chicago. He worked for the Union Pacific Railroad for many years and was also employed by the Federal Bankruptcy Court. Mead served in the U.S. Army and was a longtime active member of Saint Pauls. Mead made many friends at church. He was the last of our ushers to wear white gloves while serving communion, asked memorable questions at our Annual Congregational Meetings, served faithfully as a Connector, and was a strong advocate for Saint Pauls House.

Patricia Miller August 9, 2025

Pattie Miller loved to sing. She was a graduate of The Biennen School of Music at Northwestern University. Pattie and her husband Jim cherished their shared memories of singing here at Saint Pauls in the Chancel Choir. Pattie and Jim raised a blended family together. They retired to Lake Leelanau, Michigan, in 2022 after working together running Murphy Miller, a company founded by Jim's dad. Before their move, Pastor Jeff led the renewal of their wedding vows on their 25th anniversary in our chapel.

Clayton Root October 25, 2025

Clayton found Saint Pauls in the 1980s. He was moved to join the church after hearing Tom Henry's homily at the funeral of a close friend. Clayton was born in Crown Point, Indiana, and moved to Chicago after law school. He loved to sail, the theater, his family, and his friends. Pastor Matt will serve at Clayton's memorial service next Saturday, November 29, at the Chicago Yacht Club.

The Original 1621 Thanksgiving

The first "Thanksgiving" was a three-day celebration in 1621 between the Wampanoag first peoples and the English settlers of Plymouth Colony.

The menu most probably involved roasted or boiled wild birds (goose, duck, turkey, pigeon) and venison. Also prominent were shellfish, including lobster, clams and mussels.

The English settlers had large gardens with root vegetables, while the Wampanoag grew multi-colored corn, beans and a variety of pumpkins and squash. Both groups dried fish, gathered berries and nuts and had poultry and eggs.

The 1621 offerings were broad enough so that those who did not enjoy turkey or who preferred a vegetarian-forward celebration could still be "authentic."

TODAY'S MUSIC

Both the text and tune of *Just a Closer Walk With Thee* are of unknown origin. It appears in 99 hymnals and was first published in the mid-1940s. On a train trip to Chicago from Kansas City, Kenneth Morris (1917-1989), an African American gospel music composer, heard a porter singing this song. He asked the porter to sing it again so he could write down the melody and words. When it was published, Morris added some of his own words. It is likely that it dates back to as early as post-Civil War days in African American churches. The arrangement we hear today was made by Brendan Henry.

The text for *Christ the Victorious* was written in 1982 for the Episcopalian 1982 *Hymnal* by Carl P. Daw, Jr. (b. 1944). The text is a paraphrase of a portion of the Easter Orthodox memorial service. Daw was born in Louisville, Kentucky, the son of a Baptist minister. He holds a Ph.D. in English literature, taught at the College of William and Mary, and, in 1981, became an ordained priest in the Anglican Church. The RUSSIAN HYMN was composed in 1833 by Alexei F. Lvov (1799-1870). He was Russian born and educated and composed this hymn in one evening. Many will recognise the melody as part of the close of Tchaikovsky's *1812 Overture*, which celebrates the victory over the forces of Napoleon.

Lift High the Cross - George William Kichen (1827-1912) was the original author of the text, but there is a second "contributor" referred to as an "alterer," Michael R. Newbolt (1874-1956), who added to and improved the Kichen text. The tune, CRUCIFER, was composed in 1916 at the height of The Great War by Sydney H. Nicholson (1875-1947). He was Organist/Choirmaster at Westminster Abbey in the 1920s and had a deep influence on English hymnody.

Yours Is the Glory, A toi la gloire, ô Resussité, is an example of a hymn with a varied background. The melody is from the chorus, See the Conquering Hero Comes, in the oratorio Judas Maccabeus (1746) by George Frideric Handel (1685-1759), the famous Baroque composer of Messiah (1741). The tune, JUDAS MACCABEUS, obviously gets its name from the Handel oratorio. Edmond Louis Budry (1854-1932) composed the French text to Handel's music in 1904. Budry was a Swiss writer and pastor who wrote a number of hymn texts in French. Richard Birch Hoyle (1875-1939) translated the French into the English text with which we are familiar. Although Hoyle was born, educated, and died in England, he spent two years both as clergy and professor at a seminary in Pittsburgh.

The text for *Abide With Me* was written by Henry F. Lyte (1793–1847) in the last year of his life. After preaching the last sermon of his career, Reverend Lyte gave a copy of this hymn text to a relative and died two months later. The familiar hymn tune is by William H. Monk (1823-1889).

Goin' Home is an anthem based on a beautiful theme in the "Symphony From a New World," Symphony No. 9 by Antonin Dvořák (1841-1904). Dvořák was a Czech composer, who spent a very important part of his career in the United States. He was deeply affected by folk music of his Bohemian heritage, so it is not surprising that during his time in our country he was also moved by the African American spirituals he heard. The famous African American composer Harry Thacker Burleigh worked with Dvořák, so for many years it was assumed that the tune we associate with Goin' Home was a spiritual Dvořák had heard. The problem is that there is no record of a spiritual with that title or melody. It is a tribute to Dvořák that he created a melody that was an homage to a musical genre that was foreign to him, but also tugged at the roots of his love for Bohemian folk music. The words were added in 1922 by one of his American students, William Arms Fischer, who expressed the hope and belief of life beyond death just close by, through an open door.

The author of the text of *For All the Saints* was William Walsham How (1823-1897). He penned the poetry we love so much in 1864. How was an Oxford graduate and served many parishes in England throughout his life. Just to demonstrate that there can be a sense of humor even in hymn tune names, SINE NOMINE, means "no name" in Latin. The stirring music was written in 1906 by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). He is one of the greatest English composers of the post-Victorian era. He composed music for nearly all genres of performance.

Marcel Dupré (1886-1971) was one of the preeminent organists and composers for that instrument of the first half of the 20th century. He was the organist for many years at St. Sulpice in Paris and followed Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937) in that position. His *Prelude and Fugue in B Major Op. 7, No. 1* is part of a set of *Three Preludes and Fugues* composed in 1912. Widor, who was also Dupré's teacher, declared that this work was unplayable. We are happy that Kevin Dzierzawski is proving Widor's assessment to be incorrect.
