Haggai 1–2, excerpts

In the second year of King Darius, in the sixth month, on the first day of the month, the word of the Lord came by the prophet Haggai to Zerubbabel son of Shealtiel, governor of Judah, and to Joshua son of Jehozadak, the high priest: "Thus says the Lord of hosts: These people say the time has not yet come to rebuild the Lord's house. Is it a time for you yourselves to live in your paneled houses, while this house lies in ruins? Go up to the hills and bring wood and build the house, so that I may take pleasure in it and be honored, says the Lord."

Then all the remnant of the people obeyed the voice of the Lord their God and the words of the prophet Haggai, as the Lord their God had sent him, and the people feared the Lord. Then Haggai, the messenger of the Lord, spoke to the people with the Lord's message, saying, "I am with you, says the Lord." The latter splendor of this house shall be greater than the former, says the Lord of hosts, and in this place I will give peace, says the Lord of hosts."



TODAY'S MUSIC

Our Prelude, *The Peace May Be Exchanged*, was composed by American composer Daniel Locklair (b. 1949). He received his Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Eastman School of Music and currently holds the position of Composer-in-Residence and Professor of Music at Wake Forest University. Locklair became a professional organist at age 14.

Canadian born Jean Wiebe Janzen (b.1933) is a poet on the faculty of Fresno Pacific College. She created this text, *How Lovely Is Your Dwelling*, in 1992 for a Mennonite hymnal. ES IST EIN' ROS was first published in 1599 in the Cöln Gesangbuch. The text most often associated with this tune is *Lo*, *How a Rose E'er Blooming*.

The text for *O God Your Hand Has Brought Us* was written in 1879 by Frederick W. Goadby (1845-1880) the year before he died. He was a member of the Baptist clergy in England, as was his father before him. This is one of only three hymn texts he wrote. The tune, SAINT THEODULPH, was dedicated to Theodulph (760-821) at a later date. Theodulph was a native of Italy and became Bishop of Orleans in 785. The tune was composed by German composer Melchior Teschner (1584-1635). One of the places he studied was Wittenberg, the birthplace of the Lutheran faith. This hymn was used to open the 1952 dedication of the office, gym, chapel, and parlor wing of St. Pauls.

All Are Welcome is a recently composed hymn and one of our favorites from a past hymn fest. The tune is TWO OAKS. It dates from 1994 and the words and music were both created by Marty Haugen (b. 1950), an American composer of numerous hymns and liturgical music. This hymn was shared with Kurt R. Hansen by a college friend, Alisa Kasmir, and it has quickly become an anthem of St. Pauls' Open and Affirming ministry.

God, When You Called St. Pauls is a text created in 2018 by Pastor Matt Fitzgerald for our celebration of 175 years as a church. SOLID ROCK was composed in 1863 by the prolific hymn writer, William Bradbury (1816-1868). Raised on his father's farm in Maine, he developed a love for music as a child and began playing the organ in church by age 15. Among his best known hymns is the children's hymn, Jesus Loves Me, This I Know.

Johannes Brahms (1833-1897) was one of the pillars of the Romantic music period. He was influenced by Beethoven and steeped in the harmonic tradition of Bach. Some, especially Wagner, thought him to be artistically too conservative. His *German*

Requiem (1869) is unusual in that it does not use texts from the Latin burial rite. It was written in memory of his mother. How Lovely Is Thy Dwelling Place is based on Psalm 84, which couldn't be a more appropriate text for our celebration and dedication of the completion of our Expanded and Elevated Openness. The Brahms German Requiem stands in between those of Berlioz and Verdi as choral and musical masterpieces of the age.

The text for *God You Have Set Us* was written in 1984 and revised in 1993 by Jane Parker Huber (1926-2008). She was one of the most prolific and forward thinking hymnodists of the last half of the 20th century, having authored more than 30 hymns. Our *New Century Hymnal* includes 10 of her hymn texts, and we regularly sing *Called as Partners in Christ's Service*, one of her contributions to our hymnal. She advocated for women in her Presbyterian USA domination. In 2002, she received the Woman of Faith Award from her denomination. The tune NATIONAL HYMN was composed in 1876 by George Willian Warren (1928-1902). He was a largely self-trained musician born in Albany, New York, and became the organist at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in New York City. The very nationalistic and militaristic text many of us associate with this stirring hymn, *God of Our Fathers*, was authored in 1876, the same year as the hymn tune, by Daniel C. Roberts (1841-1897). It was written in celebration of our nation's centennial. Roberts served in the Union Army in the Civil War before becoming an Episcopal priest.

Moses Hogan (1957-2003) is a favorite composer of both the Chancel Choir and our congregation. In 1995, he composed this anthem, *God's Gonna Set This World on Fire*, based on an African American Spiritual. St. Pauls commissioned an anthem by Mr. Hogan in 2001 to honor 25 years of service of Ron McCowan as a member of our Chancel Choir. Mr. Hogan's compositions always highlighted great rhythmic and spiritual energy. Edwin B. Hogan (1940-2016), uncle of Moses Hogan, was a composer, attorney and committed community activist. Jana O'Brien penned new lyrics for *I'm Gonna Sit at the Welcome Table* to celebrate the completion and dedication of our building-wide work to Expand and Elevate Our Openness.

I Saw the Light was composed and recorded in 1952 by Hank Williams (1923-1953). He was a beloved country music singer and composer. In his all-too-short life, he recorded 35 singles, 11 of those reaching No. 1 on the Country & Western charts.

Now Thank We All Our God is a translation by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878) of the original German by Martin Rinkart (1586-1649) written in 1636. Although born in England, Winkworth spent many years in Dresden, which is why she was so adept at translating German chorales. She was also a tireless fighter for women's

rights. Rinkart became a scholar at St. Thomas School in Leipzig where Bach would later be Kapellmeister. The tune, NUN DANKET, takes its name from the first words of the German text. It is most often attributed to Johann Crüger (1558-1662), who in reality was the publisher of the psalter where this hymn tune first appeared. This hymn was also part of the 1952 dedication service at St. Pauls. The German stanza honors our founders and heritage.
