

## SCRIPTURE

Mark Sancya

### *Matthew 3 selections*

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, “Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.” Now John wore clothing of camel’s hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. People poured out of Jerusalem, Judea, and the Jordanian countryside to hear and see him in action and they were baptized by him in the River Jordan, confessing their sins.

When John realized that many Pharisees and Sadducees were showing up for a baptism because it was becoming the popular thing to do, he exploded: “You brood of vipers! What do you think you’re doing slithering down here to the river? Do you think a little water on your snakeskins is going to make any difference? It’s your life that must change, not your skin! What counts is your life. Is it green and flourishing? Because if it’s deadwood, it goes on the fire.

I baptize with water for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is more powerful than I, and I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will ignite new life within you, a fire within you, the Holy Spirit within you, changing you from the inside out.”

\* \* \*

Jesus then appeared, arriving at the Jordan River from Galilee. He wanted John to baptize him. John objected, “I’m the one who needs to be baptized, not *you*!”

But Jesus insisted. “Do it. God’s work, putting things right all these centuries, is coming together right now in this baptism.” So John did it.

And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw God’s Spirit descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from the heavens said, “This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.”





### **JOINT UCC - DISCIPLES STATEMENT ON VENEZUELA ISSUED**

The United Church of Christ and the Disciples of Christ denominations issued a Joint Statement on the "Venezuela Takeover by the United States." The joint statement condemns recent military actions of the US regarding Venezuela and calls for "restraint, respect for sovereignty, and renewed commitment to peaceful, multilateral engagement." Per the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network, the UCC is a "just peace" denomination that stands for "diplomacy over domination, cooperation over coercion, and peace over war."

## TODAY'S MUSIC

**Stumblin' Block** was composed in 2025 by Kris Hansen (b. 1995). The music expresses a collective experience of support. Kris is a member of our St. Arbucks Quartet. He was raised, baptized, and confirmed at St. Pauls. He is an active singer, music producer, composer, trumpet player, and keyboard player in his own group, Semi-Cycle. He also performs regularly with other bands including: The Walters, Kweku Collins, and Othersides. This work will be on the St. Arbucks EP, which will be released soon.

**Ding, Dong, Merrily On High** employs a text by George Radcliff Woodward (1848-1934). He was an ordained Anglican clergy who served 6 parishes in his lifetime. He was also responsible for the translation of many Greek, Latin and German hymn texts. The joyful tune, BRANLE DE L'OFFICIAL, was composed in 1588 by Thoinot Arbeau (1520-1595). His given name was Jehan Tabourot. Arbeau was his more well known pen name. He wrote a famous book about 16th century French dance styles.

**O God Beyond All Praising** is by Gustav Holst (1874-1934). The tune is called THAXTED, which is the main theme of the Jupiter movement from Holst's *The Planets*. It is truly a majestic hymn. Thaxted is the village where Holst grew up. It was Ralph Vaughan Williams that adapted "Thaxted" as a hymn. The author of our text is Michael A. Perry (1942-1996). He began studies as a physicist and changed to theology.

Both the text and tune, GARDEN, for **I Come To The Garden Alone** were composed in 1913 by C. Austin Miles (1868-1946). He was an American pharmacist from Pennsylvania. He abandoned that career to compose gospel songs. He composed hundreds of them and eventually owned the publishing company that printed song books.

**Precious Lord** was composed by Thomas A. Dorsey (1899-1993). Dorsey's likeness was recently added to our music windows on the south aisle along with J.S. Bach and Mahalia Jackson. He began his career as a blues pianist and songwriter. Later he became a church choir director here in Chicago at Pilgrim Baptist Church and was a co-founder of the National Convention of Gospel Choirs and Choruses. Widely known as the "father of the gospel song," he played an important role in the development of African-American gospel music. This is his best-known song and was composed following the tragic double death of his first wife Nettie and their new born son in 1932. It was a great comfort to Mr. Dorsey in his grief and countless

others who have sung it. Among those that sang it with Dorsey was Mahalia Jackson (1911-1972).

**Ninye otpushaiyeshi**, commonly known in Latin as the *nunc dimittis* or the Song of Simeon, was composed by Alexandre Grechaninov (1864-1956). He is primarily remembered for his liturgical music for the Russian Orthodox Church. This is a setting of Simeon's prayer upon seeing the child Jesus. God promised Simeon that he would live to see the Messiah. Grechaninov moved from the Soviet Union to France in 1925. He immigrated to the United States in 1939, and spent the rest of his life here. Old Church Slavonic has a similar relationship to modern Russian as Latin does to Italian.

George Matterling added the **Gloria Patri** in the style of Grechaninov. While the Gloria Patri is a prescribed response in liturgical western churches to biblical readings or anthems on biblical texts, it is not part of the liturgy in the Russian Orthodox Church. **A note for this time** - The Russian Orthodox Church was said to be founded by St. Andrew, one of the 12 disciples, when he journeyed from Greece to what became Kiyv, Ukraine but was then known as *Kiyvan Rus'* (land of the Rus').

The text for **Bring Many Names** was written by Brian A. Wren (b. 1936). He is a major British contributor to contemporary hymn writing. He was a pastor of a Congregational Church in Essex. WESTCHASE was composed in 1989 by Carlton R. Young (b.1926). He served in World War II and became a teacher, editor, composer and conductor. He edited two editions of the United Methodist Hymnal.

**Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern** is known to us in English as an Epiphany hymn, *O Morning Star, How Clear And Bright* that can be found in our Black Hymnal No. 158. The chorale melody was composed in 1598 by Philip Nicolai (1556-1608) who was a Lutheran pastor, poet, and composer. This chorale melody was so beloved that it was set by many composers including Bach (1685-1750). Johann Pachelbel (1653-1706) is not well known outside music circles, but his compositions, especially for organ and choir, provided a deep foundation for German composers in the following generation like Bach and his contemporaries.
