



**BLAST FROM THE PAST**

Bible Off Broadway (BOB) has a long history at St Pauls. From 1976-78 church school kids joined actors at Body Politic Theater to learn how to act out Bible stories. 1979 and 80 saw the first shows at church, done with kids from Lincoln Park Presbyterian. The 1981 and 82 productions during Lent. In 1983 the first January production took place, Noah. Under the guidance of Sharon Phillips, Bible Story Theater (BST) became a grand production and found a permanent place in the hearts of generations of kids, parents and spectators. ## **JOINT UCC - DISCIPLES STATEMENT ON VENEZUELA ISSUED**

The United Church of Christ and the Disciples of Christ denominations issued a Joint Statement on the “Venezuela Takeover by the United States.” The joint statement condemns recent military actions of the US regarding Venezuela and calls for “restraint, respect for sovereignty, and renewed commitment to peaceful, multilateral engagement.” Per the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network, the UCC is a “just peace” denomination that stands for “diplomacy over domination, cooperation over coercion, and peace over war.”

### **Contemplating the Price of Pot Roast**

Pot roast is a Sunday tradition. A recent foray to secure a large cut, yielded shock, frustration and a revisiting of basic farm economics. At more than \$20 per pound, the real question is: why is the price of beef so high?

The answer is a perfect storm of supply-demand:

- A 50% tariff on Brazilian beef and a ban on Mexican beef due to a parasitic infestation.

- Consolidation of the meat packing industry and disruption of the labor force in abattoirs and packing, largely immigrant and often undocumented.

- Drought and overall increased herd management costs in feed, energy, and stock purchases.


This imbalance will take YEARS to correct and is a good opportunity to add more vegetables to the pot.







## TODAY'S MUSIC

**Precious Lord** was composed c. 1940 by Thomas A. Dorsey. Wilbur Held (1914-2015) who arranged the setting, also has a deep Chicago connection. He was born in Des Plaines, studied at the American Conservatory with Leo Sowerby, and became Sowerby's assistant for 7 years at St. James Cathedral in the Loop. In addition to having been an active composer, he was also very involved in the American Guild of Organists and was also Professor of Organ Studies at Ohio State University for over 30 years.

The Introit, **Lift every voice and sing**, is the joyous refrain of a longer hymn that is the unofficial anthem of black churches and the civil rights movement. J. Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954), the composer, and James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938), the poet, were brothers who crafted this wonderful hymn together. They also wrote Broadway musicals and edited song collections as a team.

**Come O Fount Of Every Blessing**, to the tune NETTLETON, is from the rich American tradition of the shaped-note hymnals, specifically Wyeth's Repository Of Sacred Music. The text was written by Robert Robinson (1735-1790), who began his professional life as an apprentice to a hairdresser before committing himself to a religious life.

**Goodness Of God** was composed by the team of Jenn Johnson (b. 1982), Brian Johnson (b. 1978), Ed Cash (b. 1971), Jason Ingram (B. 1974), and Ben Fielding (b. 1988 ). It was released in 2019 on the live album *Victory* by Bethel Music. Jenn and Brian Johnson are married and also lead Bethel Church in Redding, California. Jenn is the Senior Pastor and a senior Overseer of WorshipU, an online school of worship. Brian is a pastor of Bethel Church, which was founded by his grandfather. He is also a senior Overseer of WorshipU, which he and his wife co-founded. This gospel anthem has gained wide popularity and has been covered by CeCe Winans (b. 1964).

Thomas A. Dorsey (1899-1993) began his career as a blues pianist and songwriter. Later he became a church choir director here in Chicago at Pilgrim Baptist Church and was a co-founder of the National Convention of Gospel Choirs and Choruses. Widely known as the "father of the gospel song," he played an important role in the development of African-American gospel music. His best-known song, **Precious Lord**, was composed following the tragic double death of his first wife Nettie and their newborn son. It was a great comfort to Mr. Dorsey in his grief and the countless others, including Mahalia Jackson, who have sung it. The arrangement was written by Mr. Severe while he was a student at Hyde Park High School in the 1970's. Arnold is a past Director of Music at Pilgrim Baptist Church where Thomas Dorsey got his

start in Gospel music. We can also celebrate that in 2021 both Thomas A. Dorsey and Mahalia Jackson were added to our music windows in our Sanctuary on the south aisle to memorialize their importance to Chicago, music history in general, and gospel music in particular.

***O For A World*** is a paraphrase of the 1739 hymn text, *O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing* by the famous Methodist hymnist and Theologian Charles Wesley (1707-1788). This text was written in 1982 by Mirian Therese Winter (b. 1938) for the Presbyterian Women's Triennial Conference. She is a Medical Mission Sister, having served in Africa and in this hemisphere. The tune, AZMON, was composed in 1828 by C. G. Glaser (1781-1829) and was later adapted to the melody we know by Lowell Mason (1792-1872). Glaser was a German composer that was educated at St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, the home church of, and in the generation following the death of Bach. Dr Mason was considered as the "Father of American Church Music." He was born and educated in New York.

***Trouble Don't Last Always*** was composed in 1992 for his album I'm Glad About It by the Reverend Timothy Wright (1947-2009). That album spent 4 weeks at the top of the gospel music charts. The Rev. Wright began study of the piano at age 12 and composed and directed his own gospel music as a teenager in Brooklyn at St. John's Fire Baptized Holiness Church of God. He formed his own gospel ensemble in the 1970's and he eventually became pastor of the Pentecostal Grace Tabernacle Christian Center Church of God in Christ located in Crown Heights, Brooklyn.

***God Is Working His Purpose Out*** is a favorite hymn of our deceased Pastor Emeritus Tom Henry. The text was written by Arthur Campbell Ainger (1841-1919) in 1894. The text demanded a muscular tune, which Martin Shaw (1916-1999) provided in 1951.

William G. Tomer, (1833-1896), composed this hymn in 1880. He was born in New Jersey and was of German ancestry. He learned his craft in "singing schools," and began teaching school at age 17. He composed 10 other hymns. The text for ***God Be With You Till We Meet Again*** was also written in 1880 by Jeremiah E. Rankin (1828-1904). He authored over 300 hymn texts, mostly in English but also in German, Spanish, and Russian. Rankin was a passionate abolitionist and part of the temperance movement. He was minister of the First Congregational Church in Washington D.C. and was a longtime correspondent with Frederick Douglass.

Billy Taylor (1921-2010) was a great African-American jazz pianist, composer, broadcaster, and educator. From 1994, he was the Artistic Director for Jazz at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. He also worked tirelessly to raise funds to

replace homes of older jazz musicians in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina. **I Wish I Knew How It Would Feel To Be Free** was composed in 1963 at the height of the civil rights movement and became an unofficial anthem of that movement. The New York Times called it “one of the greatest songs of the sixties.”


