Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

`And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,
are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;
for from you shall come a ruler
who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary, his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.



Caring for Creation: Tips for Better Nutrition

The following dietary recommendations by Trisha Parshina, MD, columnist for the Washington Post, are important to remember during the holidays:

1. Choose healthier animal proteins, moving from red meat to yogurt, fish and chicken.
2. Eat more fiber to preserve a healthy gut microbiome, this means choosing a variety of high-fiber plants, nuts and fermented foods.
3. Embrace whole grains- brown rice, quinoa, farro- and stay away from white rice and white flour.
4. Avoid sugar-sweetened beverages, including fruit juices; instead, eat whole fruit and drink plenty of water. Curtail alcohol consumption.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Prélude sur l'Introït de l'Épiphanie (Prelude on the Introit for the Epiphany) Op13 was composed in 1961 by Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986). Duruflé took the chant melody *Ecce advenit dominator Dominus* (Behold! The Lord is coming!), which is from the Mass for the Epiphany. Duruflé used chant as an inspiration for many of his works, especially his setting of Requiem.

O Morningstar, How Clear and Bright is one of the most beautiful German hymns, and it is prescribed for Epiphany. Philip Nicolai (1556-1608) adapted a version of a Psalm 100 chant and composed this melody and German text in 1599. The English translation is by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878). Winkworth, although born in England, spent many years in Dresden, which is why she was so adept at translating German chorales. She was also a tireless fighter for women's rights. -The tune name, WIE SCHÖN LEUCHTET MORGENSTERN, is the first line of the original German text. We will hear it 3 times this morning: the Introit, the Sermon Hymn, and it is also quoted in the Offertory Anthem.

We Three Kings is a truly American hymn. It was composed in 1857 by an Episcopalian priest, John H. Hopkins (1820-1891). His father was the Bishop of Vermont. Hopkins was also an ecclesiologist, which means he was interested in church art. He designed stained glass and other church ornaments.

Jesus Loves Me This I Know is one of the first hymns many children learn. The words are both simple and profound. They were written in 1859 by Anna Bartlett Warner (1824-1915). She was born in New York City, wrote many hymn texts and collaborated with her sister Sarah on novels. The composer of the tune, JESUS LOVES ME, is William Bradbury (1816-1868). He penned this sweet melody in 1861. He also composed the famous hymn *Just As I Am*.

Be Thou My Vision is a lovely Irish folk tune, SLANE. The translation was made in 1905 from the original Gaelic by Mary E. Bryne (1880 - 1931), who was born in Ireland. She was a respected university level academic in Dublin.

There Shall A Star Come Forth From Jacob is a chorus from an unfinished oratorio Christus Op. 97 composed in 1847 by Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847). Like Mozart, Mendelssohn had a very short and artistically productive life. He was born in Germany, but a great source of his popularity was outside his home country. He was especially beloved in England. Amongst his greatest accomplishments was the revival of the works of J.S. Bach, and the first "modern" performance of Bach's St.

Matthew Passion since his death. Mendelssohn's Elijah is performed in England almost as often as Messiah, which is, of course, by another "adopted" German, Handel. This chorus also closes with his setting of the German Epiphany chorale *Wie schön leuchtet Morgenstern*, How Brightly Shines The Morningstar.

As With Gladness Those of Old is set to the tune DIX, which was composed by W. Chatterton Dix (1837-1898). Mr. Dix also composed the original lyrics. He was a Scottish insurance company manager who also published a number of volumes of hymns.

I Saw The Light was composed and recorded in 1952 by Hank Williams (1923 - 1953). He was a best-beloved country music singer and composer. In his all-too-short life, he recorded 35 singles and 11 of those reached number 1 on the Country & Western charts.


